

Dear Friends



Baden Powell initiated the Scout Movement in 1907 and the Scout Association was formed in 1910 and incorporated in 1912 by a Royal Charter, i.e. 115 years ago depending on which start date you select! The 11th Coventry (West Orchard) Scout Group was founded in October 1936 so we will be celebrating our 90th Anniversary next year.

Over this time span there have been numerous dedicated leaders with many hundreds, if not thousands, of young people being introduced to the beauty and diversity of our world and helped, via the guiding principles of Scouting, to make the most of life.

Today we welcome, week in week out, over 130 young people (male and female) led by over 20 leaders ranging in age from 18 to 80 years – too difficult to calculate the cumulative years of service to the Group!

In preparation for celebrating our 90th anniversary, we have mapped the locations of the various camps and expeditions that have taken place and the countries visited. These maps will be displayed in the Large Hall early in 2026, please have a look. Our overseas visits have included France – both summer (adrenalin filled activities and challenges, including the total eclipse which we viewed in Normandy) and



winter (ski trips to the Alps – developing an essential life skill), Austria, Holland, Luxembourg, Italy, Finland and Russia, the latter three under the leadership of Robert Watson who is our longest serving member with a career in Scouting spanning 75 years.

On Saturday 2nd May, we will be holding a celebratory Open Day to mark the anniversary, to which we will hope to welcome scouters, both present and past. We will have a BBQ and fun activities for all – including the families and fellowship at Church. Photographs from over the years, videos of camps, expeditions and activities together with excerpts from Group shows will be on display – memories made and treasured.

Celebrations will continue with a 'special' family water weekend at Tewkesbury (Croft Farm Water Park) and our summer camp will be at Ennerdale in the Lake District, which will also be extra special. Reflection on both of these activities will be highlighted in May, to emphasise how exceptional they are.

The success of the 11th Coventry Scouts over the years would not have been possible without the support and encouragement of the fellowship at Baginton Road URC. Please join us in our celebrations and help us to realise our objectives in sustaining the diversity of opportunities made available to our young people over the coming years.

Special Cause for November, December and January

After a very successful three months of the Special Cause LOOK, during which over £350 was generously given, we are now asking for contributions for a charity suggested by Sue Matthews – National Rheumatoid Arthritis Society (NRAS).



NRAS is the only patient-led charity in the UK that focuses specifically on rheumatoid arthritis (RA) and juvenile idiopathic arthritis. (JIA)

NRAS provides:

- Information via websites, booklets, webinars and educational programmes.
- Support via a helpline, peer to peer support, family days, groups, social media and online communities.
- Advocacy and campaigning.
- Support for rheumatology health professionals and clinicians.

RA can strike at any age over 16 years old and has a devastating impact not just on physical health but also on mental health, work and family life.

JIA affects 1 in 1,000 children in the UK and is diagnosed when the child is under 16.

Until a cure is found for these conditions, people affected will need good quality support, information and advocacy on their behalf to ensure appropriate treatment.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

Age UK have estimated that about six million people over the age of 65 are not online, or are unable to use the Internet safely. Without a smartphone it is increasingly difficult to access your doctor, NHS services or car parking. Problems are now envisaged for these people as digital ID could be introduced, leading to the losing of citizenship rights.

A historian has discovered that Anne Lupton is the sister of Olive Middleton, the great-great-grandmother of the Princess of Wales. Anne established the London Housing Centre in 1935 to bring up children in a nursery school between the ages of two and five. The Princess of Wales Royal Foundation for Early Childhood has reached out to more than 500,000 youngsters.

The Reverend Dr. Samuel Annesley, who became a leading Puritan, was born in Haseley, north-west Warwickshire in 1620. He was educated in the Free School, Coventry and Queen's College, Oxford. In July 1648 he preached before the House of Commons, advocating that they should give up negotiating with a

deceitful King. In 1657 Oliver Cromwell nominated him to be Lecturer at St Paul's and the following year he was appointed to St Giles Church, Cripplegate, London. The Act of Uniformity 1662 resulted in him and 2,000 Nonconformist ministers being expelled from their livings after refusing to subscribe to episcopacy and the Thirty-Nine Articles or to give his "unfeigned consent and assent" to everything in the Prayer Book. The next 25 years saw him preach privately and often have his chattels confiscated. He died on 31 December 1696, having had two wives and fathered 25 children. The youngest child was Susanna, the mother of John Wesley.

Did you survive October's "invasion" of spiders? The largest house spider is the harmless Cardinal Spider with legs spanning up to 120mm (4.7in), usually brown-coloured with dull stripes on their bodies, and most often seen prowling around at night. They are named after Cardinal Wolsey who, legend has it, was terrified of the spiders at Hampton Court.

In the UK we have successfully grown tea and tobacco and now are trying with rice in the fenlands of East Anglia and celery in the north-west of England.

The Sorbonne (Paris) University's chapel, built in the first half of the 17th century under the instructions of Cardinal Richelieu as his personal legacy, has been closed since 1999 due to storm damage. It is now to be renovated and will be overseen by the World Monuments Fund, a US-based preservation organisation. Once open, there could be concerts, exhibitions or tours, though not religious services. None are held on French campuses nowadays because of the country's secular laws.

Behind the Scenes at Baginton Road URC

Someone recently remarked that we have several groups and committees here at Baginton Road, but they had no idea who they were or what they did. Over the coming months the magazine will feature two committees each month and explain who they are and what they do. This month we look at Personnel and Premises and Management.



Personnel: Meetings have been quarterly and on ad hoc basis; this Committee will be merging with **Admin** in the new year.

- Members: Colin D, Trevor G, David L (Chair), Lesley R, June W.
- Responsibilities: Oversight of all personnel and employment matters on behalf of Baginton Road URC.
- Duties: employment of staff, hiring, job descriptions and person specifications, interviews. Staff development issues in response to annual reviews undertaken by line managers. Employment policies and procedures, keeping them updated in line with URC and legal requirements. These policies include: Equal Opportunities, Disciplinary Procedures, Grievance and Resolving Disputes, Harassment at Work, Lone Working, Redundancy and associated procedures. Employment contracts, keeping them updated in line with URC and legal requirements. Ensuring the ongoing implementation of employment policies and procedures through liaison with, and feedback from line managers and staff.

Premises and Maintenance: Meetings are normally bi-monthly; ad hoc meetings may be called as required.

- Members: John D (Minutes), Trevor G, Kevin G, David J, David L, Pauline L (Chair), George S (Caretaker).
- Responsibilities: To enable the Church in all practical aspects to fulfil its Mission Statement.
- Duties: The day-to-day care and maintenance of the church premises and grounds, Warwick Road and West Orchard Centres. Security of the church and Centre premises. Long term planning of repairs and renewals to church premises including the bungalow. Making recommendations to Elders and Church Meeting regarding fundamental changes to church property and major expenditures on repairs and maintenance. Liaising with the Finance Committee re charges for room lettings, insurance cover and the annual budget to be allowed for repairs and maintenance. For repairs and

maintenance bills of £500 or more, the support and approval of Finance will be needed. Supporting the Caretaker in his role.

Except for Luncheon Club committee which comprises the team of cooks, the groups are not exclusive to the Elders and new people are always welcome. If you are interested and feel you would like to join any of our committees, please speak to Sue D or Pauline L.

Theological Reflections

During our recent service led by the Elders, Sue D reminded us of our church vision statement that "together we want to build a vibrant and welcoming church which is an active presence in the community, offering varied styles of worship, helping people to grow spiritually and learn more about God's love." The difficulty is how to fulfil that in our church life so that we share daily the love of

Jesus. Crawford's preaching exhorted us to trust in Jesus and strive to live according to his teaching; as Dietrich Bonhoeffer (2015) wrote, discipleship comes at a cost both to Jesus and us.

There is always a cost and a choice with following Jesus. In his study, Karl Barth had the painting of Mattias Grunewald's 'Crucifixion' scene from the Isenheim Altar. He comments that a key aspect of this painting is the long finger that pointed to Christ while holding the scriptures. For Barth (1936, p.126) the outcome of Christian witness has to be that it points to Jesus and the Church should need to emulate this. How do we allow our lives to Jesus?

There is some helpful advice in a recent blog by Rural Ministries* entitled "*The vision is Jesus*" which addresses the question of what our priorities are. Have we become so engrossed in our programmes and structures that we have lost sight of the purpose behind them, namely sharing the love of Jesus every day? I would encourage you to read the full article, but I just want to mention three images – container, lens and voice.

The author uses the term 'container' to describe the Church and the activity that goes on within. He writes: "held within this 'church container' are some who are passionate about preserving its heritage, history, traditions and ceremonies; while others are so enthused and excited by breaking out of its confines to forge new paths and 'ways of walking.'" God constantly reminded the Israelites it was He who was the "God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob" (Exodus 3:15) and He had delivered them from oppression in Egypt (Lev 11:45). However, God builds on the foundation of their history to give them new promises. Our 'container' history is important, but

as we move forward, we need to ensure we are pointing others to Jesus, perhaps in new and different ways, uncomfortable as that maybe for some.

In 'The vision is Jesus,' the article asks whether "this statement underpins all that you do in your endeavours for God and Church? Is Jesus truly the vision, the impetus behind all your decisions, the lens through which you see the world?" You might remember the 1982 Bucks Fizz hit "My camera never lies" suggesting that the camera lens produces a true image; however, even this image is manipulated by light, speed and perhaps the skill of the photographer (or Al!). Jesus gave a simple instruction: "go and make disciples" (Matthew 28:19) but we have manipulated that lens with our denominations, programmes, biblical interpretations and personal preferences. If we look at all our programmes, services, relationships and activities through the lens that our 'vision is Jesus' then we will continue to have an active (and growing) presence in the community; however, if we take our eyes off Jesus, like Peter did (Matthew 14:29-31) and focus on our programmes and personal preferences, our Church will start to sink. We need to keep our eyes on Jesus and listen to him.

Whose voice are we listening to? There are so many varied voices in our lives, some more dominant than others, but whose voice are we hearing above all the others? While we may receive words of wisdom from Elders, church members, friends, partners or Synod, the voice we should be listening to is Jesus. If he is our vision, then we should be listening to Him. Jesus reminded his disciples (John 10) that he was the good shepherd, and He knows us and we must listen to his voice. Are we listening to Jesus' voice as we seek to learn and share God's love?

The article concludes with a challenge: "as you reflect, do you need to return to the vision of Jesus? Has the vision of programmes, evangelism, services, or even mission, overshadowed Jesus as the vision? What steps might you need to take in order to return?" This is a really challenging question, we often do not like to admit we got it wrong, but as a Church we need to ensure that our vison is Jesus and we are listening to his voice. We need to fix "our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith" (Hebrew 12:2).








WORDSEARCH

St Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland, though his only connection with the country is that some of his bones were reputedly transported in the 8th century to Fife and preserved at a church in what is now St Andrews. Andrew was one of the first disciples of Jesus, and the very first to bring someone else to Christ - his own brother. Like many Jews at the time, Andrew and an unnamed companion had been drawn to the prophet John the Baptist. When one day John pointed out Jesus to Andrew and his friend, and described him as the 'Lamb of God', the two young men assumed that the next stage of their spiritual search was about to unfold. So they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and asked them what they were 'seeking', all they could come up with was: 'Where are you staying?' The reply of Jesus was the most straightforward invitation anyone can receive: 'Come and see'. So they did, with life-changing results. For Andrew brought his brother, Peter, to Jesus, and so the apostolic band who would carry the message of Jesus to the whole world was formed. And right at the front was Andrew, the first disciple of Jesus.


