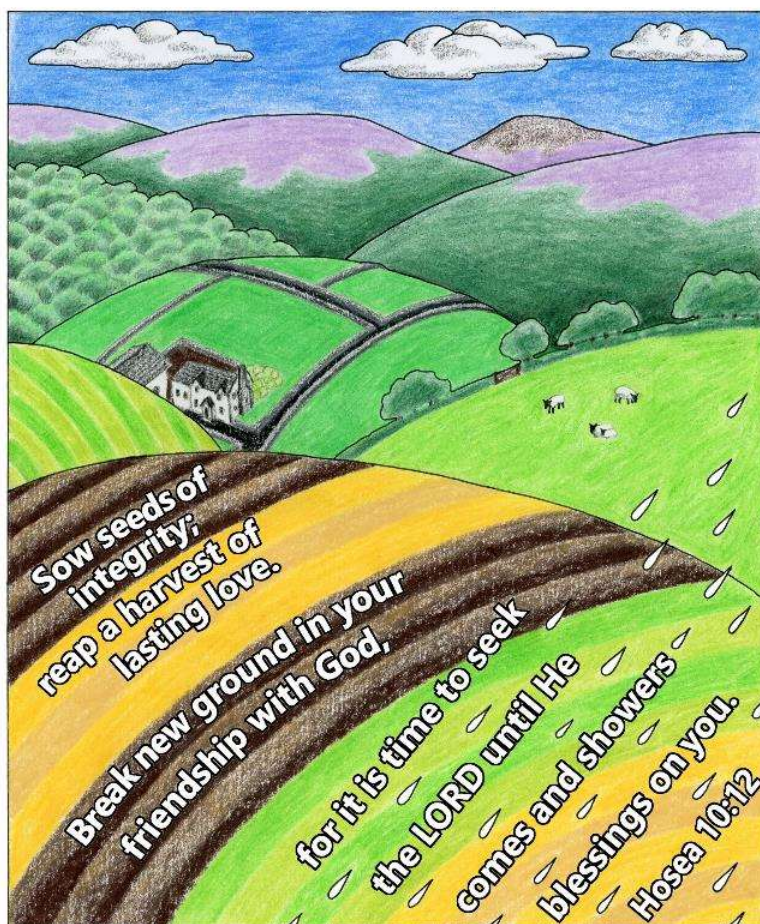

Dear Friends

A few of you, no doubt, will have taken advantage of the special offers which various hotels have advertised in recent days in an effort to recoup lost revenue over the last 18 months or so – certainly the Stone family has. 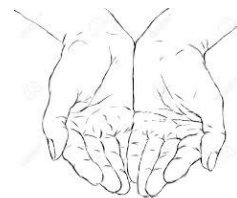
Women's Prayer Breakfast

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

The Churches Conservation Trust has 356 abandoned churches under its remit. These are very predominately Church of England and are mainly Grade I or II* listed, but with a budget of £4m from the Government and Church Commissioners, it is hard to sustain the buildings in the long run. Fundraising has been successful, but can this be sustained? In Saintbury, Gloucestershire, St Nicholas Church urgently needs £150,000 for roof repairs to save its 17th century frescoes. In September a fundraising celebration took place and the longer-term plan is to turn the church into an arts centre. Other conversions have seen a nursery, soft-play centre or farmers' market, and in Worcester a combined cafe with worship area. Fundraising activities have included overnight camping in a church ("champing"), and even a beer festival. Coventry Cathedral hosted a gin-tasting event the other year.

In 1525 a Richard Wright bequeathed small pockets of land in Fulbourn, Cambridgeshire, to a trust for "the repairing and keeping of the clock in the Church of St. Vigor and the ringing of the curfew and the day bell". Since then, the land became 17 acres, was formed into a trust and is now rented to a local farmer. Cambridge University's oldest college, Peterhouse, has just bought 9 acres for £18.5m. Because of trust restrictions, the money can only be spent in Fulbourn.

The Church of England is preparing for compensation claims from former followers of a cult-like movement known as the Nine O'Clock Service (or NOS) that started in the Sheffield area. This was a nightclub-style evangelical movement aimed at young people, which started in the 1980s and 1990s. It ceased in 1995 following a BBC documentary and a Sunday newspaper revelation.

Thomas Cromwell was known as, amongst many things, a radical religious person. Research of his rented London townhouse seems to contradict the image of an evangelical Protestant. A report in the Journal of the British Archaeological Association by Dr Nick Holder on the inventories shows he kept items such as holy relics and a home altar, more in keeping with an English Catholic.



An interim report of the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse has said that some religious organisations in England and Wales were "morally failing" children. The Inquiry has heard evidence from 38 groups, including Christians, Jehovah's Witness, Baptists, Methodists, Islam, Judaism, Sikhism, Buddhism, and non-conformist Christian denominations. The hearings have led to 15 reports and it is hoped a final report will be published in 2022.

The Church of England Bishop of Ebbsfleet has resigned upon his conversion to be a Roman Catholic. He did not support women joining the priesthood or the 2014

move to allow them to become bishops. Of the 110 bishoprics within the Church of England there are seven vacancies.

A survey to record the details in 19,000 graveyards within the Church of England has started and will take seven years to complete. The plan is to laser-scan the headstones, graves and memorials, thus creating a "Map for Graves". The project is funded by Historic England, National Lottery Heritage Fund, Family Search and My Heritage. Family historians will be especially pleased as basic information will be available free of charge.

In July the Vatican announced that the annual worldwide collection in Catholic churches for the Pope's charities (known as Peter's Pence) amounted to £44m, which was less than in any of the previous three years.

Harvest Foodbank donations

Harvest Festivals: West Orchard 10 October & Warwick Road 17 October

Our harvest gifts will be donated to Coventry Food Bank for distribution to the 12 centres where people can bring vouchers to collect their food. These centres include Coventry City Mission, where we have donated in the past, and St Catherine's Stoke Aldermoor, where West Orchard have been donating over the past 18 months. The system has changed now and all donations are centralised at the main warehouse, bagged up into food parcels and then sent out to the distribution centres to give out, ensuring a better flow of food.

In August in Coventry:

- 16,884.14kg of food was donated by individuals, businesses and supermarkets
- 18,928.4kg of food was given out in food parcels
- That leaves a shortfall of over 2,000kg, the equivalent of 5,000 regular tins!

In 2020 over 390 tonnes of food was donated in Coventry.

In the UK 2.3m children live in households which experienced food insecurity during the pandemic.

22% of all households in the UK have lost income compared to before the pandemic.

With the exciting news of an impending merger with our sister church, West Orchard URC, we have taken the decision to delay the appointment of my replacement. My predecessor Trevor Gay (of Coffee Shop Sunday fame) has never really gone away and he will now increase his hours on a temporary basis to cover 'management' issues. We also extend a very warm welcome to Ruth Mohamed, who many of you will already know from the church choir. She recently took over the role of Office Assistant and will be working in the Office alongside Trevor and George.

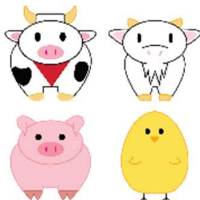

The Way I See It

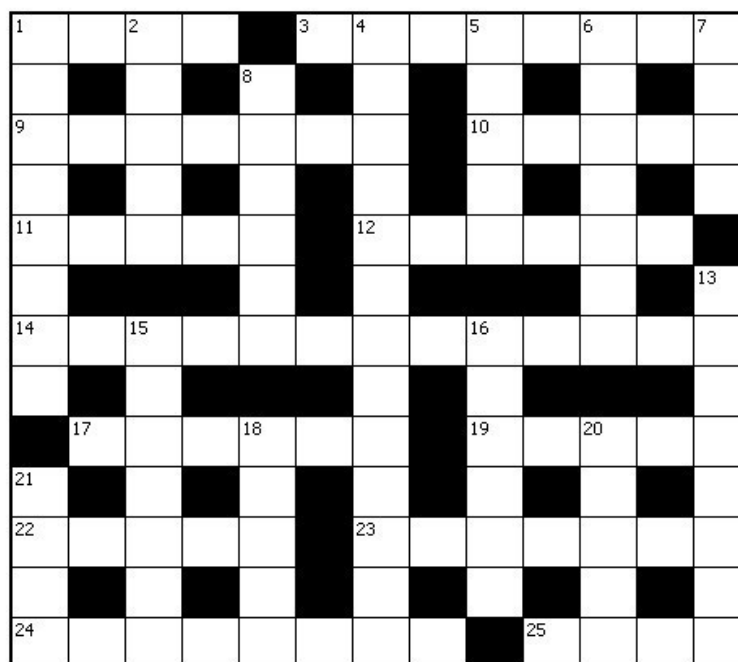
I have recently written a short pamphlet (12 pages) called '*The Way I See It*'.

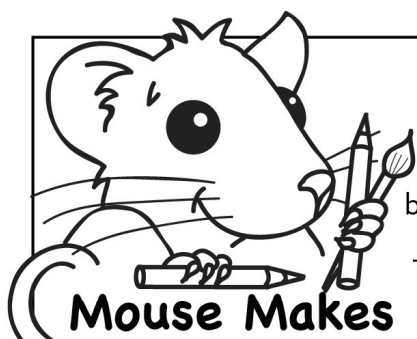
