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Dear Friends

Blessed are those who make peace, for they will be called God's children. ... Strive eagerly to preserve the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. [Matthew 5:9; Ephesians 4:3]

Every so often an industrial dispute hits the headlines and we in Coventry have even made the 6 o'clock news with the current bin lorry drivers' dispute over pay and conditions. I don't intend on writing about the rights and wrongs of each side but I do wish that someone would suggest arbitration as a way forward if it already hasn't been tried.



Having had training in mediation and arbitration through Bridgebuilders, I know how hard the conciliation process can be when you are dealing with two implacably opposed sides, each entrenched in their own particular viewpoint and determined that they will not give ground on anything.

But I also know how satisfying it is to succeed in bringing warring parties together until common ground is eventually found (and it can take quite some time) and an agreement reached. For those involved in industrial mediation and arbitration I think they must have special gifts and make an invaluable contribution to us all.

Few of us will ever be involved in such high-powered negotiations as are required in Coventry at the moment, but we can all be mediators, helping to work in some small way for peace. We do need to do so sensitively, of course, for it is not for us to assume that we have all the answers, but there are times when we can be peacemakers, pouring oil on troubled waters, helping people to see the other side of an argument or defusing a tense situation through a well-chosen word or action. In short, we too should work towards reconciliation.

Do that – humbly, responsibly and lovingly – and we will truly be called God's children, helping to build God's kingdom on earth as it is in heaven, more than we may ever realise.

Lent Knitalong

Knitters at Victoria Methodist Church (Bristol) are holding their third Lent Knitalong this year and warmly welcome knitters from all over the country (and beyond!) to join them.

The Knitalong will take the format of weekly emails throughout Lent, consisting of a set of daily knitting instructions (or 'clues') and specially written meditations for each day.

By the end of the Knitalong, each knitter will have completed a cushion cover. The design of the cushion cover is a surprise but will only use simple knit and purl stitches, so should be achievable by knitters of all abilities.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

Did you welcome 2022 on 31 December? In Russia, only in the last few years have they officially celebrated this event. During the era of Stalin, both Christmas and New Year were banned. The festival Yolka was introduced as a secular New Year holiday featuring songs of praise for the Communist Party. Even after 1991 there was no Christmas but this festival has slowly re-emerged. This year, 6 January was the Orthodox Christmas with 13-14 January for those using the old calendar. In other words, one week of celebration.

In India, the Hindu nationalist government has been heavily criticised for announcing on Christmas Day that it was not extending Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity's licence to receive outside funds. The government said that it had "adverse inputs" about the charity's work which is interpreted that the nuns convert Indians to Christianity, which the order denies. Also, the Indian government has told Oxfam that it can no longer receive donations from abroad. Oxfam began operations in India in 1951 and became independent in 2008, working in 16 states.

The Basilica Sagrada Familia in Barcelona welcomed 4.7 million visitors in 2019. In 2020 visitor numbers were down to 764,000 due to Covid-19 and travel restrictions, but in November 2021 the second highest tower, which is 138m tall and incorporates a 5.5 tonne star on its highest point, was dedicated to the Virgin Mary. This is the ninth tower to be completed, the first since 1976, with 18 in total planned. It had been hoped for the Basilica



to be completed in 2026 as this is 100 years since the death of Antoni Gaudi but this has been stymied by not only the pandemic but also objections by local families to proposed further expansion, including the demolition of three blocks of flats and the building of a vast ramp and stairway to the entrance.

Frank Skinner, one-time stand-up comedian and co-writer of the song *Three Lions*, and also a practising Roman Catholic, has recently published a book, *A Comedian's Prayer Book*.

The Bible story of the arrival of Baby Jesus refers to astrologers. On 4 January 2022 at 7am the Earth was at perihelion, when it reaches its closest distance to the Sun in the entire year. But it is cold because of the tilt of the Earth on its axis. Astrologers have calculated that in 11,000 years our seasons will have been reversed.

150 years after the carol *In the Bleak Midwinter* was written, the Church of England has commissioned a new version. Composed by Rebecca Dale in conjunction with Classic FM and St Martin's Voices of St Martin-in-the-Fields Church, London, it was released on 1 December 2021 and immediately reached the No.1 spot in the classical charts, where it stayed during December. Profits from this recording were donated to homelessness charities.

26 January 2022 was the 73rd Indian Republic Day celebrating when the Constitution of India came into effect in 1950. It is a public holiday with parades, distribution of sweets, speeches and cultural dance. There is an Indian Beating of Retreat ceremony which once included songs such as the *Colonel Bogey* march and *Sons of the Brave*. This ceremony is based on a British custom marking the moment when soldiers stopped fighting, putting down their arms and withdrawing from the battlefield. This year the last hymn of the ceremony *Abide with Me*, reputed to have been the favourite of Mahatma Ghandi, was withdrawn in favour of popular Hindi songs. This decision has raised a debate on "why not also stop the playing of bagpipes, trombone and drums" but others say "it is good as this tune reeks of 19th century capitulation and slavery unleashed by the East India Company". The hymn's lyrics were written by Henry Francis Lyte in 1847 and set to the song *Eventide* composed by William Henry Monk.

Attracting birds to your garden

Spring is coming and many of us would like to encourage birds into our gardens. Here are some hints from the RSPB about how to be successful with nest boxes.

Try and choose a box made out of wood from a sustainable source so it is good for the planet. The birds don't really care for ornamentation. Simple boxes are usually best as they provide fewer things for predators to cling onto. Finally, it is a good idea to clean nest boxes in autumn after the birds have finished raising their young. This is much easier if you buy a box which is easy to open.

The most common type of nest box with a single hole will attract a variety of garden birds. Check the size of the hole: for blue tits, coal tits and marsh tits, a 25mm hole is ideal, while great tits, tree sparrows, pied flycatchers and house sparrows all prefer a bigger 32mm hole.

Boxes for tits and sparrows should be 2m - 4m up a tree or wall. They should be north or east facing or under cover to avoid direct sunlight and the wettest winds. There should also be a clear flight path to and from the nest. Sparrows prefer to nest together, so if you have space, consider putting up a number in a row.

Robins prefer open-fronted nest boxes. This looks like a classic nest box but instead of a hole it has a larger open front. Robins or pied wagtails like a 100mm high open front, wrens like a 140mm high front panel and spotted flycatchers prefer a low 60 mm front to the box. For wrens and robins, the nest box needs to be placed below 2m, but well-hidden in vegetation.

World Day of Prayer



Friday 4 March 2022: Methodist Central Hall 11am; Holyhead Road URC 7.30pm

The World Day of Prayer is a huge world-wide movement, uniting Christian people all around the globe. We share this service annually, from the rising of the sun in the East to its setting in the West, wherever we are on the first Friday in March.

This year the service has been prepared by the Christian women of England, Wales and Northern Ireland. Scotland has its own service.

Perhaps this is the moment for a look back at history:

- 1920: A call was sent for all churchwomen to come together on the first Friday in Lent to pray for Christian mission throughout the world.
- 1928: An International Missionary Conference was held in Jerusalem. The Day of Prayer became known as the World Day of Prayer. A member of the United Free Church brought news of the World Day of Prayer to Scotland.



- 1930: The first World Day Prayer service was held in Scotland, probably in a house. The day became known as the Women's World Day of Prayer in many countries.
- 1932: The Women's World Day of Prayer began in England, spreading to Wales in 1933 and Ireland in 1934.
- 1968: The International Committee (ICWDP) was formally started and the first Friday in March became the World Day of Prayer.
- 1980: Scotland celebrated 50 years of the Women's World of Prayer. The word 'Women's' was then dropped from the title.
- 1982: A new logo, developed by women of Ireland, was adopted as the international logo. The logo comprises of arrows converging from the four points of the compass; four figures kneeling in prayer; the Celtic cross; the circle representing the world and our unity through our diversity.

More than 180 countries join in the World Day of Prayer and services are held in over 1,000 languages.



Mission Outreach and Worship Report for March 2022

I have been working behind the scenes for the last few months; however, some of this work is now starting to come to fruition and I would like to inform you all of some of the progress made so far. There are three ongoing projects which will make a positive difference to our lives here at Baginton Road.

Firstly, as we seek to gain the EcoChurch Silver Award, we approached Garden Care Ltd a little while ago to rework our grounds in a more eco-friendly way. Last month we received a quote to improve the grass areas with a selection of wild flowers and to create some lavender and buddleia borders so as to attract more insects and birds. Garden Care Ltd have agreed a ground management plan which has gained approval from the Elders. In the summer we will see the benefits of these changes with more flowers and wildlife around the buildings. Also, I now realise that our bird feeding station needs moving from its current position at the back of church, to where all can see it and access it. Please feel free to top up the feeders with seeds and nuts. I intend to relocate this to the area by the left of the main church entrance.

Secondly, we are starting the process of redesigning the apse at the front of the worship area. The many levels and dangerous steps need to be altered to improve our ability to offer different types of worship into 2023 and beyond. I am working with our church buildings team and two architectural students to bring you a vision of a reworked front of church very soon. We will in time be presenting this vision to church meeting to elicit your approval. I know this has been much talked about in the past so I hope to move this forward soon so we can all benefit.

And finally, I'm delighted to announce that with the approval of the Elders we are starting a new Wednesday morning toddler group. Working with a professional organisation who provide soft play and bouncy castle equipment, we hope to attract many young families to our buildings on alternate Wednesday mornings. I'm hoping with the help of a team of volunteers to offer a



hospitality area in the small hall so we can offer a warm Christian welcome to all the families who attend these mornings. As always, I'm looking for volunteers, so if you're able to assist on Wednesday mornings please get in touch.

In other news:

Coffee mornings are going from strength to strength. Tuesday is particularly well attended, with people coming in from inside and outside our church community. Please come along for a hot drink and biscuits. See the notice board for more details. I thank all my willing volunteers (you know who you are) for helping make this such a success.

Unfortunately, the chair-based exercise classes on Tuesday mornings are not being supported as well as we had hoped. It might be that we will withdraw this offering. If this is something you're interested in but can't make Tuesday mornings let me know and I'll perhaps rearrange for another time.

The Move It or Lose It fitness class is going well. This is a more active exercise class running on Friday mornings that is now attracting around 15 participants. Thanks to Liz Kershaw for her enthusiasm and becoming the lead member from the church in this venture.

Thank you to everyone in the church for all your help and support. Best wishes and God's blessing to you all.
