Dear Friends

Back in 2015 we were in vacancy, and I was approached with the request to write the message for what was then *The Link*, the magazine for West Orchard URC. I agreed, reluctantly. Here we are in 2022 and once again we have said farewell to another

minister, Yvonne. Our future regarding ministerial support remains unclear. Someone needed to write the Christmas Message for Connections and I actually volunteered this time. Seeking ideas, I looked back on my 2015 effort, and I realised that what I wrote then is just as relevant now as it was seven years ago, so I make no apology for recycling it and bringing it to you again.

Whilst putting up my decorations for Christmas, I like to play Christmas songs to help get me in the festive mood. I happened to pay more attention than usual to the lyrics of a golden oldie '*Mistletoe and Wine*' sung by Sir Cliff Richard. The words set me thinking and it is these words and thoughts I have chosen to share with you.

'The Child is a King, the Carollers sing, The old has passed there's a new beginning.'

As December draws to its close, many of us turn our thoughts and hopes toward the New Year, but our thinking should start before then. Surely it starts with the birth of a tiny child - a child born into a world of sin and darkness; into a family which lacked any material wealth; a family which did not boast a royal palace for a home; to parents who promised to show obedience to God and to love their child and one another as God had commanded. It is this birth, this precious gift of Christ our Saviour, which should shape and influence all we wish for in 2023.

'A time for living, a time for believing, A time for trusting, not deceiving, Love and laughter and joy ever after, Ours for the taking, just follow the Master'.

Time is precious; how often do we wish we had more? Perhaps, in 2023 we should consider how we use the time God has given to us - could we manage our lives differently and thus create more 'free time'? If so, how would we use it: in prayer, reading our Bible, attending a Bible Study or Home Group? You might choose to spend the time alone, talking to God in prayer. These situations can test our belief in God. We talk to God, and He listens. He does not always provide the answers we would like Him to, but we must learn to accept His will and trust in Him.

The new year will, like any other, have its difficulties for all of us here at Baginton Road. With our minister now retired we know that we will face huge changes as we step forward into a new phase in the life of our church. We need to put our trust in God and in the Eldership and to pray continuously. We need to be open and honest with each other about what we think and feel as we explore what is right for our church and the membership.

There is love in abundance within our church family. Anyone who has been through testing situations will confirm this. Love is all around us: in the acts of fellowship, the social activities, the meetings we attend, the giving of time and money, it is there reaching out and enriching our lives, and where you have love, laughter is never far behind. Love flows from our shared love of the Lord Jesus.

The final verse of the song reminds us -

'A time for giving, a time for getting, A time for forgiving and for forgetting. Christmas is love, Christmas is peace, A time for hating and fighting to cease'.



For me, this is the verse with the greatest challenge. I can cope with the giving and the getting - both bring immense pleasure at Christmas and at other times throughout the year. Forgiving and forgetting are much harder. To offer forgiveness, you need to experience hurt, a hurt which sometimes strikes deep within the heart. It is this deep hurt which challenges our ability to forgive, but unless we can forgive and forget the wrong which has caused the hurt and to put the past behind us, then we will never be able to move on fully with our lives. In an equivalent way, the person being offered forgiveness must accept it with grace and humility and both must allow time for the hurt to heal whilst making every effort to heal the broken relationship.

I invite you all to make the effort to put behind you any past differences, disagreements, unhappy situations from 2022 and earlier, and try to forget them and any hurt they have caused. In the spirit of true forgiveness, let us take each other by the hand and in unity reach out for the hand of our forgiving God, which is stretched out before us. Let us as true believers in Him, walk forward with faith and in confidence into 2023.

May love and peace be with you all this Christmas time, and throughout the coming year. God bless you all,

Christian Aid Soup Lunch

For most people 5th November means fireworks but for the faithful of Baginton Road URC, this year it meant soup!

By 11.30am the Small Hall was already filling up and the appetising aroma of 11 (!) delicious but different soups pervaded the air. By 12.30 all seats were taken. No sooner were the hungry served than, in true Oliver Twist style, they asked for "more". The regulars engaged the "newbies" in animated conversation whilst the contingent from the Belonging Church sampled almost all the soups with obvious pleasure.

Huge thanks are due to the super soup-makers, the early birds who prepared the tables and oversaw the soups, the smiling servers and the willing washer-uppers. Excellent teamwork! An enduring memory will be Pam, food thermometer in one hand and soup ladle in the other, checking that the simmering soups were kept at temperature.

Everyone gave generously, raising £276 which with Gift Aid meant that £345 will be sent to Christian Aid. If we add this sum to the £1,200 raised by the 300,000 Step Walk, then Baginton Road URC has raised altogether a staggering £1,545 for Christian Aid. Thank you all for this tremendous level of support.

I hope you all remember the article in September's *Connections* which prompted us to respond to the dire





Advent Knitalong

Following on from the mystery Lent Knitalong, there will be a mystery Advent Knitalong, starting on Sunday 27 November.

The Advent squares will be knitted in DK yarn (a solid colour will work best). You will need approximately 40 - 50 grams of yarn to complete all four squares. Use 3.75mm or 4mm needles if you're an average knitter. They are designed to be coaster-sized, or they can be sewn/knitted together to make a larger table mat for Christmas Day. You could also stuff and sew them together in pairs or back them with fabric to create Christmas tree decorations.

All four patterns and the weekly reflections will be released in one single document on Sunday 27 November with a suggested schedule to finish on Christmas Eve, but of course knitters can work at their own pace. If you would like a copy of all the patterns and reflections, please see me.

St Francis of Assisi started singing in churches in the 13th Century.

The word "Xmas" is not irreligious as the letter X is a Greek abbreviation for Christ.

The word "Noel" derives from the French expression "les bonnes nouvelles" - the good news.







Pauline's Tribute to Yvonne

Yvonne: After your predecessor left in 2014, the members of what was then West Orchard URC spent many hours discussing and sometimes arguing about the future of ministry for our church and its members. It soon became obvious that no matter how loud we shouted, how hard we stamped our feet and how unpopular we made ourselves with the area and Synod we were not going to get what we wanted – a full time minister. We were going to have to share ministry with at least one other church, maybe more, and several options were put before the Elders and church meeting. We felt that the best option, other than that of a full-time minister, was to become part of a shared pastorate. You expressed an interest in becoming our minister and your name was put forward to the Elders to consider. We viewed your profile and invited you to come along to an Elders' meeting in order to find out a little more about you and your vision for our Church. Following this meeting you were invited to come and 'Preach with a view'. This happened in February 2015 and included afternoon tea followed by yet another session of questions, this time from the members. A Special Church Meeting held the next evening agreed to extend the call to you to be our Minister which of course you accepted.

As I was acting Church Secretary at the time, it was my privilege to be involved in planning for your induction which was held here on Sunday, 26 April 2015. I have since come full circle – I am again Church Secretary and I have been responsible for organising, along with others, our celebration today; a celebration of your time with us, of your achievements and all that you have meant to us. We soon realised that services didn't need to last for an hour and that it was possible to preach God's message in a sermon of less than 20 minutes. We accepted and came to enjoy subtle changes in the style of worship including using more visual resources. On Sunday mornings some of us even had to move about! More of us were encouraged to take an active part in worship whether we liked it or not. And above all we came round to the idea of having to share your ministry. However, as always God had a plan, more of this in a moment.

During the pandemic you encouraged us to keep in touch with each other and as a Church via Zoom. We held regular online coffee chats and Elders' meetings, Advent and Lent courses, Sunday worship and, when easing of lockdown enabled services to resume face to face, WR and WO were invited to join together in worship, meeting at each church on alternate Sundays. We began to make new friends – God's plan was being put into action! In 2021 both churches passed resolutions to join together and form a new church here on this site and you led the first service of Baginton Road URC on Sunday, 6 February 2022. It was an emotional experience for both congregations, but I personally have taken great pleasure in watching new friendships evolve and groups made up from both former congregations working together in all aspects of church life. We still have much to do as we step out on our new journey together but under your guidance, we have made a pretty good start.

I know there are many families who are grateful for the numerous services you have led to unite couples in marriage, celebrate new life through baptism and blessings, and to join in thanksgiving for lives when we have lost loved ones. There are not many here today who have not been able to share your care, compassion and love when conducting these special services, and for this we say a special Thank You.

Yvonne, right at the start of your ministry at WO you joined one of the mid-week walks and you were aware of my personal disappointment at being overlooked concerning a church matter and you asked me if I would like to be your mentor. I agreed hoping I would not let you down. Only you know the answer to that and I'm not asking you to tell me the answer in front of all these people just now. I think I've been pretty fair – during the past seven years I've shared many things with you: hospital crutches, surgical boots and broken bones, to name but a few. The worrying aspect was when one of us suffered an injury then the other also suffered a similar one not long after. It wasn't helped by Ted reminding you that if you were injured I ought to be warned or if it was me, then you were told to be careful.

I think the mentoring has worked both ways because for me, Yvonne, you have not only been my minister, you have also been my friend; we have laughed together, been through sad and difficult times, and shared confidences with one another, the hardest one being you telling me you had decided to retire early but nobody else knows yet! I will miss you being here.

Time moves on, people move on and you now feel that your work here in this place is complete. You have brought us to this stage in our journey and now it is time for someone else to take over and lead us into the next phase and for you to take on new challenges too.

Part of our gift to you is to let you go, albeit reluctantly, and in so doing, we give you our promise that we will remember your message of recent months and that we will not give up on ourselves but will continue to pray and ask God for guidance and look to him for answers whenever we are in difficulties.

Thank you for being our minister, for being a part of our spiritual lives and for bringing us to where we are now. We will miss you and Ted, but we know that not all the Stones will be rolling away – one will be staying behind to help prop us up in his new role as our Premises Caretaker, George, we wish you well in your new role, and you will be visiting him quite often to ensure all is well. We can therefore rest assured that today is not goodbye but 'au revoir' and God speed in the next chapter of your life.

And so, to the rest of our gift: as a token of our love and appreciation we have a plant to adorn your new home, something for the garden and something in the envelope to enable you to purchase some much-needed item which hopefully will remind you of us.
