Special Cause Appeal

Notes from Elders' Meetings

December 2022:

- Concerns from members were discussed along with how we move forward to address these issues soon.
- Area Deployment is under review by all churches in the Synod area and Elders will be attending a second meeting on Saturday, 28 January at Holyhead Road URC.
- To encourage both negative & positive comments, the Suggestion Box to be replaced with a Comments Box.
- Morning of Mission is being planned for January/December this will be an
 opportunity for everyone to come together and talk about what we want for
 our church as we move forward on our journey through 2023.
- To improve security, the locks have been changed and new keys issued to keyholders. These keys cannot be copied and entrance with keys will be via the Office door only.

- Issues with the boiler are hopefully being resolved; new free-standing heaters
 to use in emergencies have been purchased rather than pay a weekly higher
 charge which was quite excessive.
- A review of how we distribute Holy Communion has resulted in a decision to continue with the present method of collecting bread and wine as you come into church. This will be reviewed again in three months.
- A new Pastorate Profile has been produced for Baginton Road URC. Hard
 copies will be available after Christmas for you to take away and read, and
 then return so that others can look at it. Electronic copies available on request
 from Kevin. A proposal to accept the new profile will go before the Church
 Meeting on Sunday, 12 February.
- A group is reviewing the Rules for the Election of Elders.
- A rota for door stewards is being introduced, so if Gill M approaches you please take a turn welcoming people to our Sunday Worship.
- We are also reviewing our Welcome procedures.

January 2023:

- A STATE OF THE STA
- Elders are due to attend an area meeting at Holyhead Road URC on 28 January to discuss area deployment.
- We are planning a 'Sharing Together' morning following on from that held in March 2022 when we hope as many members as possible, and friends of Baginton Road URC, will come together and review the past year and discuss how we move forward on the next stage of our journey. The date is to be confirmed.
- Review of the various copyright licences was carried out. Some changes were agreed, which will slim down the number we use.
- We discussed contingency plans for conducting funerals, weddings, and baptisms. We have two authorised persons who can preside at Holy Communion, and they are also able to carry out baptisms. There is training available for anyone who wishes to put themselves forward to conduct weddings or funerals.
- Elders agreed provisional arrangements for the Holiday from Home activity,
 31 July 2 August.
- Explore possible dates for the Knitted Bible exhibition to return to Baginton Road URC.
- Agreed Steve Elton should implement Phase 2 of his project for our church.
- Peter working more closely with WRC one day per week; Elders are being invited to accompany him.
- Quotes are still being sought for the redevelopment of the apse, and arrangements are being made for the disposal of the pulpit.
- Becoming an Eco-church this is work in progress.

I recently received a request from WMAS to house a bleed kit in our cabinet. These have been supplied by a local charity. Although they have received press coverage related to stabbings, I was assured by the paramedic the main use is in road traffic collisions. Our location close to the South Coventry main roads makes it an ideal location.

Please note, emergency access to the defibrillator or bleed kit is only available via the 999 service.

Traidcraft plc going into administration



The disappointing news that Traidcraft plc has gone into administration means that we will no longer be able to purchase the supplies of coffee, tea, Christmas and Easter Cards which we have had in church for several years. It's especially disappointing for those people who love the decaffeinated coffee and teabags which were available.

Traidcraft's directors made this announcement on 20 January 2023, explaining that the business has been in a weak financial position for some years and the Covid-19 pandemic presented a significant new set of challenges. These were then compounded by the combined effects of the war in Ukraine, rising energy prices and increased transport costs.

On a positive note – the charity arm of the organisation, Transform Trade (previously Traidcraft Exchange), will continue its work supporting producers and fighting for trade justice. You can support this by coming to our Big Brew Breakfast on 4 March.

Coventry residents need photo ID to vote at elections in May

Coventry City Council has highlighted a new government requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station. As a result, Coventry residents will need to show an accepted form of photographic ID to vote at this year's local elections. This was introduced by the Elections Act 2022 which comes into effect this May.

Accepted forms of ID include:

- a UK, European Economic Area (EEA) or Commonwealth passport
- a UK, EEA or Commonwealth drivers' licence
- and some concessionary travel passes, such as an older person's bus pass.

The full list of accepted forms of ID is available on the Electoral Commission's website at electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID. Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for free ID online at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk/ or by completing a paper form.

If residents need any help with applying for a Voter Authority Certificate or want to request a paper application form, they can contact the Council's Electoral Services team: electoral.services@coventry.gov.uk; tel: 024 7683 3034.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM THE UK AND AROUND THE WORLD

Cambridge scientists have calculated that 200,000 tonnes of CO² emissions per year would be avoided if all 4.15m Roman Catholics in England and Wales reverted to the tradition of forgoing meat on a Friday. In 1985 this tradition (which can be traced back to at least the 9th Century) was changed when the bishops gave permission to "perform some alternative work of penance".

A person who was a chorister at Queen Elizabeth II's 1953 Coronation has said that for a congregation of 8,000 at Westminster Abbey there was a combined choir of 350, which included 19 women from the Dominions. Afterwards, the then Archbishop of Canterbury and the Director of Music recommended that in a future coronation there should be no female singers!

The Metropolitan Police have had to pay £10,000 in damages to a Christian preacher who was arrested twice at Speakers' Corner in London for allegedly breaching the peace and other public order offences. Hatun Tash, who moved to the UK eight years ago from Turkey, is the director of *Defend Christ, Critique Islam* with 700,000 YouTube Followers, and is a former Muslim who converted to Christianity. She has also been attacked at Speakers' Corner wearing a Charlie Hebdo T-shirt whilst critiquing the Quran and Islam but the police have yet to make an arrest.



"Ring for the King" is the name of an appeal for at least 8,000 new bellringers needed for the Coronation of King Charles III on 6 May 2023. There are 6,000 sets of bells across Britain with almost 38,000 bells which require one ringer per bell, according to the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers. It takes about 15 hours of

training to manage one bell alone. The Master of St Martin's Guild, which runs the Birmingham School of Bellringing, said there is an upturn in people inquiring how to become a bellringer and that there could be a waiting list for training.

A shrine to St Chad has been re-built in Lichfield Cathedral. St Chad (634 - 672) was a bishop of Northumberland and Mercia. He died in Lichfield and his remains were buried on the site where Lichfield Cathedral now stands, in a "little wooden house" according to the Venerable Bede. In the Middle Ages they were placed in "a gorgeous tomb chest" as part of a lavish new tomb but in 1538 the remains were taken by Canon Arthur Dudley and were then passed from priest to priest. They were later divided between a site in France and St Chad's RC Cathedral in Birmingham. When Archbishop Maurice Couve de Murville of Birmingham Diocese requested the bones to be scientifically examined in 1985, the casket was found to contain three femurs! In November 2022 a piece of bone was given to Lichfield Cathedral as a gift from the Archdiocese of Birmingham as "a token of the growing friendship and quest for Christian unity between churches that has been divided since the 16th century".

250th Anniversaries

In October 2022 at the parish church at Ottery St Mary, Devon, a statue of Samuel Taylor Coleridge was unveiled on his 250th birthday. The erection of the statue involved fund raising of over £80,000 and four planning applications. The sculpture was by Nicholas Dimbleby (brother of Jonathan and David) who was asked to capture the poet as if he were on a country walk, notebook and pen in hand. The Romantic poet imagined in his childhood he saw an "old church tower" and heard bells as "the



poor man's only music". This church is where Coleridge played as a child before being sent away aged 8 years to Christ's Hospital, a charity school in London, following his father's death.

On 1 January 2023, the church of St Peter and St Paul, Olney, held a service to commemorate when the Revd John Newton, a curate, preached 250 years ago from 1 Chronicles 17: 16-17: "And David the king came and sat before the Lord, and said, Who am I, O Lord God, and what is mine house, that thou hast brought me hitherto? And yet this was a small thing in thine eyes, O God; for thou has also spoken of thy servant's house for a great while to come, and hast regarded me according to the estate of a man of high degree, O Lord God."

From this passage comes the hymn *Amazing Grace*, which has been sung by many at weddings and funerals, recorded by many, and even played on the bagpipes. Revd Newton wrote this hymn and also *Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken*, which are contained in a book of hymns with the poet William Cowper.




The Rev John Newton (1725-1807) went to sea aged 11 years with his father. He was press-ganged in 1744 and served approximately one year with the Royal Navy before being transferred onto a slave ship. In March 1748 his ship was caught in a severe storm in the North Atlantic where he marked this moment of his religious awakening but he did another similar three voyages before having to

stop in 1754 after suffering a convulsive fit. He became involved in an evangelical Christian movement whilst working in Liverpool and was ordained in 1764.

He was then appointed vicar of St Mary's, Woolnoth, London, and in 1788 published a pamphlet called *Thoughts Upon the African Slave Trade*. The first edition was sold out and a copy of the second edition was sent to every MP. He appeared before the Privy Council and at Parliament for hearings on slavery. Rev Newton died in 1807, nine months after Parliament had voted to abolish the slave trade in the then British Empire.



In New Testament times, 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, 40 days after Christmas. Jesus is described in the Bible as the Light of the World, and so early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day - hence the name, Candlemas. The story can be found in Luke 2:22-40, where Simeon makes his great declaration of faith and recognition of Jesus. Simeon's 'Nunc Dimittis', is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer.
