Dear Friends

In our Tuesday Home Group, we are looking anew at Great Prayers of the Bible. Our first session 'Regular Prayer' asks us to consider afresh the Lord's Prayer.



As a model for everyday prayer, the Lord's Prayer is certainly unsurpassable. However, our group agreed that its language may become somewhat too familiar and formulaic, perhaps even inappropriate in certain situations. With this in mind, we would like to share with you excerpts from more accessible versions which clarify meaning and reflect different situations.

In one primary school version, 'Our Father' is introduced as 'God, you are awesome'. That certainly sums up our God in kids' speak. Quite an accolade!

In a New Zealand Lord's Prayer, God is asked to 'sustain a commonwealth of peace and freedom'.

The First Nations' version of the Lord's Prayer asks the Great Spirit that 'the ways of the spirit-world above may be reflected in the earth below', vividly clarifying 'Thy Kingdom come'.


In Luke 11, we read that the disciples asked Jesus to teach them how to pray. In response Jesus gave them the words which have become known as the Lord's Prayer, in Aramaic, which was the common language of Judea in the first century AD. Jesus probably spoke a Galilean dialect of Aramaic.

Thus we can use the Lord's Prayer as a template for our own private prayers, taking each phrase in context and introducing the particular thanks, needs and desires which we want to bring to the Lord.

There can be few Christians who feel they pray often enough. This may therefore be a good time to re-assess and re-adjust our prayer priorities, perhaps by considering the Lord's Prayer as a pattern to use on a regular basis.

Notes from Elders' Meetings - June 2023

 Boilers – awaiting response from Synod re application for grant towards the cost; once this has been received the order can be placed. Asbestos survey showed no evidence of asbestos in boiler room.



- Meeting to discuss whether we should appoint a Pastor is arranged for 7.00pm Monday, 3 July.
- Finance to revisit room hire charges. The Manse is now occupied.
- Elders there are 11 serving elders and 22 non-serving elders for BRURC.
 Of the 22, eight are actively involved attending meetings and in some cases
 leading a subgroup or committee. We can elect 10% of our total membership
 (which stands at around 105) to the Eldership, so our current number is within
 our allowance. Therefore, we are deferring an election until the AGM 2024
 with the aim of maintaining continuity in these early days of our new church at
 Baginton Road.
- Elders have agreed to create two new posts: Assistant Church Secretary and Assistant Church Treasurer; the latter will be deferred until after all the financial legalities are completed. The search for an Assistant Church Secretary has already begun.
- People will be asked to sign up for the AGM tea and indicate what food (if any) they are able to bring and share. The tea will be followed by the AGM.
- Officers and representatives of organisations to be approached in advance of AGM to see if they are willing to continue in post.
- Agreed to hold café style worship at least twice each year.
- Holiday Club will take a 'sabbatical' this year.
- Social events taking place were approved and details have been sent to members and friends.

The Good Neighbours Project: Forming Friendships Throughout Coventry



The Good Neighbours Project is a scheme that works to find volunteer befrienders to visit lonely or socially-isolated older people.

Each year, we connect several hundred over-50s to befrienders. The volunteering involves a time commitment of between 30 and 60 minutes weekly or fortnightly. In this time, our

volunteers visit isolated older people for a chat in their home, a game or craft activity, or perhaps go for a short walk round the block.

Myriad successful friendships have been formed, beneficial for both the volunteer and the older person. Jack, 85, was recently lonely due to his wife moving into care. A kind local man, Omar, came forward to be his befriender, as they shared mutual interests and hobbies. We knew the match would be a hit when we introduced them and they got chatting straight away - they've been loving a fortnightly meet-up ever since!

Everyone aged 18+ is welcome to volunteer. We have such a wide variety of older people with a diverse range of interests looking for befrienders, so there will be a match out there for you.

In Cheylesmore, we currently have several clients awaiting the right volunteer to come forward. For example, Ellen is looking for a female friend to visit in an afternoon. Ellen has a passion for gardening and would love to find someone who shares her hobby! Meanwhile, Anila is looking for a regular chat in Gujarati and English, and Jim would like to chat about steam trains or rugby.

Being a befriender is really rewarding - you directly impact the life of an isolated person. It can be the highlight of a person's week to see your smiling face - and it might become the highlight of your week too!

Mission, Outreach and Worship Report for July & August 2023

I invite you all along to our introduction to a Christian faith course starting in August. *Christianity Explored* gives people time to think about the big questions of life as they explore the life of the person at the heart of the Christian faith – Jesus Christ.

Plus Saturday 7 October: Christianity Explored Away Day (venue and time TBA).



NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

It is the time of year for travel and also for car windscreens to be splatted with winged creatures. There are millions of beetles, although only 400,000 species have been identified by the Royal Entomological Society. A biologist commenting on his life's work was that it had taught him about the possible mind of the Creator: "God must have had an inordinate fondness for beetles".

Eco-Church is not a new thing. Centuries ago, especially in the countryside, the churchyard was often also a hay meadow, and after the hay was cut, sheep were used to graze the aftermath which meant the treading in of the wildflower seeds. The hay was considered part of the rector's stipend for the feeding of his horse(s) on which he travelled to visit parishioners. The hay crop was protected by a statute of Edward I: if anyone should damage the rector's hay crop, he could demand compensation.

Historic England has listed several Ukrainian landmarks in England, protecting them for years to come. All of these are in the north of England which has a high concentration of links created over decades since the late 19th century by people who wanted to keep Ukraine in their hearts and their heritage alive. They include:

- the memorial at North Bierley cemetery, Bradford, which overlooks the graves of many people of Ukrainian heritage and celebrates 1,000 years of Ukrainian Christianity, as well as those who gave their lives for their country;

- Peter and Paul and All Saints Church in Oldham: this was built in 1889 and has kept its original features, but has added a screen of icons in the eastern European style plus a baldacchino (a metal canopy over the altar);
- St Chad's Catholic Church, Manchester which served Ukrainians from the 1920s to the 1950s;
- a Victorian church adopted by the Orthodox church; and
- a Georgian villa that became the Huddersfield Ukrainian Club.

In 2020, the number of weddings fell to its lowest in 182 years as the Covid pandemic shut venues. There were 85,770 weddings in England and Wales with 103,592 divorces. The average age of the men getting married rose to 35.3 years and the women 33.2 years. Research shows more couples living together without the legal protection of marriage.

Portugal's Parliament has legalised euthanasia for people who are terminally ill and in intolerable suffering, after debating this four times in three years. The Bill was sent back each time for a constitutional review by the President who is a practising Catholic. It was passed by 129 votes to 81 with one abstention. Members of the Parliament decided to ignore the political veto of the President, arguing that the law had been long-debated and modified. The law could come into force this autumn but

only for Portuguese citizens and people with residency. Foreigners will not be able to travel to Portugal to seek assisted suicide. Euthanasia and assisted suicide are allowed in only a handful of European States, including the Benelux nations and Spain.

The Rt Rev Christopher Budd died on 1 April 2023. He was the Roman Catholic Bishop of Plymouth, covering Dorset, Devon and Cornwall. He lived simply, took in the homeless and refused to sweep allegations of child abuse by clergy under the carpet. Upon his arrival in 1994, he sold the palatial bishop's dwelling and moved into a modest flat. No more chauffeur and car, plus he advised the nuns that brought him coffee every morning that this was a waste of their vocation. He was one of the first to employ a lay woman rather than a priest for a secretary and increased numbers of lay Catholics working for the church, including a 300-strong network of catechists (teachers of the principles of Christian religion); also, he sought to eradicate notions of priests as a superior caste, holier than lay people. In the Cathedral, due to lay pressure, he had to abandon plans to install an immersion pool for baptism but moved the lectern off the altar into the aisle. He had the pews moved by 90 degrees, but this was reversed by his successor.



William Wilberforce and friends were very socially conscious. Besides slavery they founded the Society for Superseding the Necessity of Climbing Boys (in sweeping chimneys) and also the Friendly Female Society for the Relief of Poor, Infirm, Aged Widows and Single Women of Good Character, Who Have Seen Better Days.

In Norwich in 1780 the Benevolent Association for the Relief of Decayed Tradesmen, their Widows and Orphans was founded. It is still continuing its good work today.

Sometimes Health and Safety notices are correct, but there is also a different interpretation!! Seen in a crematorium "What to do in the event of a fire" and above a dustbin "No hot ashes".

A school district in the US state of Utah has removed the Bible from elementary and middle schools for containing "vulgarity and violence". The move follows a complaint from a parent that the King James Bible has material unsuitable for children. This is after Utah's Republican Government passed a law in 2022 banning "pornographic or indecent" books from schools. No explanation was given on the reasoning or which passages contained "vulgarity or violence". However, there is an effort by US Conservatives to ban teachings on controversial topics such as LGBT rights, racial identity and America's history of slavery. The Bible has frequently been challenged as being unsuitable for children and was removed from shelves of school libraries in Texas. The same school district has filed a complaint against the Book of Mormon, the foremost scripture of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints which is the dominant faith in Utah, one of the most religious states in the USA.

Warwick Road Centre and Café - July / August Update





On 3 July the Church remembers St Thomas, also called Doubting Thomas because he would not believe his fellow disciples' news of the Resurrection. But 'doubt' did not mean that Thomas did not love Jesus! Only a few weeks before, Thomas had urged his fellow disciples to follow Jesus to see Lazarus in Bethany, despite danger from the Jews. "Let us also go, that we may die with him." (John 11:16). Instead, Jesus had brought Lazarus back to life. Thomas was sometimes very confused about just where Jesus was headed. But in John 14:5 Jesus untangled his confused commitment: "I am going to my Father" and "No one comes unto the Father but by me." Finally, after the Resurrection, Jesus appeared to Thomas, showing him the wounds of His crucifixion. Thomas was electrified and his response immediate: "My Lord and my God" (John 20.26). Thus Doubting Thomas' honest doubts, turned to honest faith, have become a reassurance for thousands of people down the centuries.
