

Dear Friends

When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." [John 8:12 NIV]


NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

Hearsall Baptist Church has announced that it is to merge with Holyhead Road URC next year to form a Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEP). The original 1928 church was first established in Lord Street as a chapel and Sunday School; in 1961, it moved to its current location on the corner of Fife Road and Queensland Avenue. The move coincides with the retirement of their Minister, Revd David Sutcliffe.

The Right Reverend Karwei Dorgu, who became one of the first black bishops in the Church of England, has died. The eleventh of 12 children, he first became a doctor then a priest in Nigeria, before moving to the UK and working in London. Wherever he worked from, he displayed a plaque that read "If at first you do not succeed, try doing it the way your wife told you".

Concern is expressed in Old Road, Tiverton, Devon, about the Roman Catholic St James's Church. Built in 1967 as a church with social centre, it has now put in a planning application for enlargement, including a belfry and spire! Neighbours have expressed concern about the noise impact but the planning officers state the bells will be the equivalent to "light traffic noise".

Andrew Motion, the former Poet Laureate, and Professor Stephen Regan have compiled a book about grief, *The Penguin Book of Elegy*, with 600 pages of poems on death, loss, and consolation. This book is collated alphabetically to introduce "an element of happy accident".



Birmingham Cathedral is home to four exquisite stained glass windows, designed by Pre-Raphaelite artist Edwards Burne-Jones, that are considered by many to be some of the most precious stained glass windows in the world. These have now been cleaned, which took 500 days. The colour and manufacture of the windows was undertaken in the workshop of William Morris, who was a close friend of Burne-Jones for many years. Burne-Jones had a deep connection with St Philip's, being baptised there and spending his childhood nearby on Bennetts Hill. The four windows were installed over a 12-year period between 1885 and 1897, before St Philip's was given cathedral status. They depict four key scenes from the life of Christ, reflecting the religious beliefs of their designer. The first window to be installed was the Ascension; either side in the chancel are windows depicting the Nativity and the Crucifixion. The west end of the cathedral has the Last Judgement.

The rebuild of Barcelona's Nou Camp Football Stadium has included a "forever" room where ashes of up to 26,000 supporters can be stored close to the pitch. The urns will be stored behind large murals. This is the fifth European stadium to offer such a facility.

More than 200 years ago Christianity was taken to Hong Kong and now the reverse is taking place. Research has shown how Chinese Christian church services are

impacting on the UK Christian family. In Manchester a congregation that was 200 pre-Covid, now is 2,000 spread over four sites. Of these, 80% are Cantonese speakers from Hong Kong.

In the heart of Istanbul stands Christ Church, built in 1868 on land given to Queen Victoria by Sultan Abdulmecid I and opened as a memorial to the Crimean War. It is one of three Anglican churches but has fallen into disrepair. In 1989 Canon Ian Sherwood arrived and started repairing the Church and its grounds. Once restoration had been completed the church was opened for refugees as a hostel. The 1911 organ, built by William Hill & Son, was in bits until a refugee Nigerian who had worked in Lagos Cathedral arrived. He repaired the bellows and fitted the pipes but did not know about tuning. Later, a visiting clockmaker from the Netherlands was able to do that. Now, the organ is played accompanying the liturgy and also performing recitals every weekend by a Russian refugee from Crimea who trained at the Moscow Conservatory. He is part of the growing community of thousands of Russian émigrés in Istanbul.

A recent report states it is impossible to quantify how Covid disrupted attendance at Church of England services. Regular worshippers in 2019 numbered 1.1m, but this had dropped to 984,000 in 2022, whereas 2021 was 966,000. "Church at Home" continues for those unable to attend in person by online, telephone, post or e-mail but thankfully the use of these methods has decreased.

Letter from Tearfund Action

Rita Dalton has received an update from Tearfund Action, a charity which works with local churches and organisations in more than 50 countries to tackle the complex challenges of poverty. Below is an edited version of this email:

Thank you for praying with us through the Rubbish Campaign Week of Prayer and Action! Many people got in touch to tell us they were joining Christians across the world to pray for the outcome of the third round of UN global plastics treaty talks (INC-3). In Brazil, campaigners organised 24 hours of prayer throughout Sunday, before the negotiations kicked off on Monday in Nairobi.

We're already seeing signs of God answering prayer. Here are a few highlights so far:

- Rev Dennis Nthenge, a Tearfund campaigner and coordinator of Green Anglicans in Kenya, has handed an open letter signed by more than 80 African faith leaders to delegates at the talks, including the chair of the African Group. This has had huge levels of global media coverage, amplifying the voice of African communities most impacted by plastic pollution.
- We were able to support waste pickers to set up a photo exhibition inside the UN building where the talks are taking place, to raise awareness of the key role they're playing in the negotiations.
- Dr Tiwonge Mzumara-Gawa, an ecologist and Tearfund campaigner, has been able to encourage those delegates who are less ambitious to go further, and has supported the delegation from her native Malawi.
- The US Government said their position has shifted to being more ambitious. As they are powerful players in the room, this will really help progress.
- In Bolivia, young people who are part of the Rubbish Campaign met with government officials and UN representatives to influence their response. They also brought together church leaders who, after the meeting, said they had been 'woken up on how to take care of the environment'.

All of these are testament to the power of praying for the treaty and all those involved in the negotiations.

But despite these encouraging signs, there are also concerns. Countries, including Russia, Iran, Saudi Arabia, China, Bahrain and Cuba, have formed a new coalition, the Global Coalition for Plastic Sustainability. Their aim is to delay the process and prevent the first draft of the treaty – which contained lots of ambitious and justice-focused elements – from being accepted. Statements from group members suggest

they're trying to shift the focus away from 'turning off the tap' of plastic production to just clearing up the rapidly growing mess.

We need to see an agreement on an ambitious target for reducing plastic production – a target that sets a common goal and timeframe, which requires every country to take action.

Plastic pollution is impacting people living in poverty the most. Billions of people don't have a safe way to dispose of it, meaning they are forced to dump and burn it, making people sick and increasing the risk of flooding. And the rapid growth of single-use plastic is making the problem worse.

Please pray that, despite the attempts of certain countries and vested interests, governments at INC-3 will continue to make progress. Pray that they agree on next steps, working towards an ambitious treaty that delivers real change for people living in poverty who are impacted by plastic waste the most.

Soup Recipes

Following the success of the Christian Aid Soup Lunch that we held in November, it has been suggested that we include at least one soup recipe a month so we can all try them at home. The first two are from Pauline L and Lesley R.



Broccoli & Stilton Soup

This is a simple recipe to follow and takes no longer than 45 minutes to prepare, cook and blitz. Great starter for a Christmas Meal over the festive period too. Enjoy!

Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp rapeseed oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped

- 1 stick celery, sliced
- 1 leek, sliced
- 1 medium potato, diced
- 1 knob butter
- 1 litre chicken or vegetable stock (I use the Knorr stock pots – 2 pots in 1L of boiling water)
- 1 head broccoli, roughly chopped
- 140g stilton, crumbled

Method

1. Heat 2 tbsp rapeseed oil in a large saucepan and then add 1 finely chopped onion. Cook on a medium heat until soft.
2. Add 1 sliced celery stick, 1 sliced leek, 1 diced medium potato and a knob of butter. Stir until melted, then cover with a lid. Allow to sweat for 5 minutes then remove the lid.
3. Pour in 1 litre of chicken or vegetable stock and add any chunky bits of stalk from 1 head of broccoli. Cook for 10-15 minutes until all the vegetables are soft.
4. Add the rest of the roughly chopped broccoli and cook for a further 5 minutes.
5. Carefully transfer to a blender and blitz until smooth.
6. Stir in 140g crumbled stilton and stir until smooth.
7. Season with black pepper and serve.

Leek & Potato using a soup maker

Ingredients

- 280g potatoes, peeled and cut into small, bite sized chunks.
- 3 leeks.
- 1 onion, chopped.
- 55g butter.
- 850ml cold vegetable stock.
- Salt & pepper, season to taste.
- Single cream, to serve (optional).



Method

1. Add all of the ingredients to the Soup Maker, give it a quick stir and select the Purée function.
2. Season with salt & pepper to taste, serve in warm bowls swirled with cream if desired.

Alongside Jesus, a series of 'enlightened' human beings, have also been recognised as divine Messengers, anointed ones, (Christs) or Wisdom Teachers. Each prophet's teaching became the cornerstone of a major world religion. The messengers have included Abraham, Krishna, Zoroaster, Moses, The Buddha, Muhammad, Guru Nanak and Baha'u'llah.

Let us also bear in mind the words of the Dalai Lama who has said that, even as we come to understand other faiths, our primary task is to move deeper into the ocean of wisdom already within our own faith.

As Christians we are called by Jesus to begin a journey of discovery in this life. We are called to waken to the truth that our being, our life, is but an expression of the of the great 'I am' that shouts from every atom, star, galaxy and life form in the Universe. There are numerous passages in the writings of every faith that seek to say the same thing.

To build God's future, the core message of all religions and all spiritual searching is that we need to discover 'ourselves', exploring fresh ways of living in the now of God's reality. We can do this within our own faith background, without converting to another faith or insight. Nevertheless, from this time on, we must be open to all that God has made plain through the insights of all the faith founders, and countless other deeply spiritual human beings.

The time is now very short to learn to live sustainably and in harmony with one another on this planet, yet together we can change the world.

A final thought – in the November 2023 issue of *Connections*, Sue Davis asks, 'What is your special place?'. To me anywhere that is very quiet, where I can meditate is a special place - God has a very quiet voice.






WORDSEARCH

The much-loved carol *Silent Night* comes from Austria, where it was first sung as *Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht* on Christmas Eve, 1818. It was written by Father Joseph Mohr, a young priest at St Nicholas parish church, in the village of Oberndorf bei Salzburg. As Christmas approached, he asked the local schoolmaster, Franz Xaver Gruber, to compose a melody for his carol. Gruber was organist in the nearby village of Arnsdorf, and so was happy to oblige. On Christmas Eve they presented the carol to the church during the midnight mass. The carol went on to become loved worldwide; the version sung by Bing Crosby is the third best-selling single of all time.
