

Dear Friends

Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus. [1 Thessalonians 15:16-18]



In many churches today, the weekly prayer meeting is usually the most unattended in the programme, or it has completely disappeared altogether. A praying church is a healthy church, and instead of putting prayer last or at the bottom of the agenda it must and has to come first. I am excited as we move into a season where we begin to reflect on our prayer lives (individually and collectively as a church), developing and ushering in our Prayer Strategy at Baginton Road URC.

In scripture, we are presented with a clear picture of what prayer is, how to pray the right way and how to get results from our prayers.

In James 5:13-16, the Prayer of Faith, we see that God encourages us to pray in all circumstances – whether we are happy or in trouble. There is no good or bad time to pray; the more we pray, the better. 1 Thessalonians 5:17 encourages us to "pray continually" (NIV) or "pray without ceasing" (NKJV). How can you pray without ceasing? Is that possible? To pray without ceasing is to have constant access to the Father and include Him in every area of our lives. We can be in a constant flow with God all day. The Passion Translation of this verse sums it up beautifully: "Make your life a prayer."

I am sure you will agree that building a relationship with someone without communicating with them would be impossible; or declaring that someone is your best friend, but you never talk to them. Prayer is our communication with God and helps us to cultivate a deeper relationship with Him. When you pray, God listens because you're His child, and you pray according to His will. What is so amazing is that God relates to you as though you are the only one in the world. How special is that?

I want to continue to encourage you to speak to God. He loves you, and He wants to hear your voice. As you strive to develop your relationship with God, here are my top tips for prayer:

- 1. Have daily, regular times of prayer.
- 2. Commence each prayer session by reading a short passage in the Bible. Daily devotions such as those on 'YouVersion', the 'Every Day with Jesus' or 'Lectio 365' apps are all very good examples, encouraging and challenging you to seek intimacy with God every day.
- Pray through the day's problems as they arise and talk to God immediately when things happen. He can provide the help you need at that very moment.

- 4. **Cultivate the habit of talking with God as a friend.** There is no need to be formal! Use natural, everyday language; this way, you can express your thoughts and pray effectively.
- 5. **Be honest with God because He knows the truth about everything.** There is something special about pouring your heart out to God as your Father it is so comforting!
- 6. **Research / study what the Bible says about prayer.** Find out all the things that have happened in scripture as a result of prayer. You will be encouraged to see how much prayer has accomplished and continues to accomplish for God's Kingdom.
- 7. **Listen while you pray.** Set aside a time and comfortable location where you can focus on God, wait in silence, and be undistracted and spiritually receptive.
- 8. **Pray with others.** When you do so, it unifies you with other believers. Remember the passage from Acts 12:1-17 we explored: the impossible happened when they prayed together.
- 9. **Make a prayer list**. It is a simple tool which will encourage you to focus during prayer times and remind you to pray for others. You will become more effective when you get into the habit of consistently praying for others.
- 10. Use prayer resources to help strengthen your prayer life. By the grace of God, we will soon have some excellent resources on prayer available in the new Prayer Room. This will include books that teach you how to pray effectively and encourage you, prayer cards, and a recommendation of films on prayer that will inspire you.

Prayer is one of the most powerful weapons God has given us! May your prayer lives be strengthened by the power of the Holy Spirit, in Jesus' Name.

Notes from Elders' and Church Meetings

May Elders' Meeting:

 The Gaza Appeal raised £240.62 which included Gift Aid; this amount was matched from Church funds bringing the final total to £481.24.



- Pastor Sherry outlined her ideas for a Prayer Strategy which includes making the BR Sitting Room a room for Quiet Prayer (the room will still be available for other activities) and using the Quiet Room at WR Centre as a Prayer Room.
- Elders discussed arrangements for the Elders election and the 2024 AGM. Amendments were made to the list of Officers and Representatives. The AGM will start at 7.00pm and will follow a Bring and Share tea which will be at 6.00pm.
- Room bookings at BR will become the responsibility of the Church Admin Officer. Kevin will have an increase in his hours to accommodate this added responsibility.
- Card reader machine: further information is needed before a decision can be taken.
- Elders supported the Lone Working Policy, and it will go before Church Meeting for approval.
- The Elders discussed membership and Pastor Sherry gave some suggestions as to how we might increase our membership.
- Elders approved safety measures to enable the Scouts to pursue air rifle activities and comply with rules laid down by the Scouting Association.
- Junior Church: from June all departments will combine and meet in the Sitting Room with two leaders delivering age-appropriate activities. This arrangement will mean finding only two adults instead of four each week. The arrangement will be reviewed as or when numbers increase.
- Church Secretary has carried out Advanced Safeguarding Training.
- Redevelopment of the apse area is nearing completion and cleaning of the Sanctuary will take place on 16th / 17th May. The next phase (improvements to the AV system) will go ahead as soon as possible using Bob W's legacy to finance it.
- Elders received Group Reports and updates prior to the Church Meeting.

Church Meeting, 8th May 2024:

- Pastor Sherry shared her ideas for a Prayer Strategy; further details are in the minutes which are available at the rear of the Sanctuary.
- The meeting agreed to receive Graham and Sue C into membership of BRURC.
- Members were given details of the Elders election.
- Reports from several groups and committees were approved.
- A summer raffle will be held in aid of Church Funds.

- Upcoming diary dates were shared.
- The meeting agreed that on completion of the redevelopment of the Apse, professional cleaners should be hired to deep clean the Sanctuary.

Prayer Time on Your Phone



I can remember awhile back going to a talk on Prayer where the speaker told us that, as followers of Christ, if we were too busy to talk to God each day, we were too busy. I have always remembered that and it's a good reminder to us all that prayer should be of all-consuming importance to each of us every day. If

you're a bit like me, however, although I feel I'm in constant conversation with God on a daily basis, it is the sitting down and actually talking to God and listening to what He has to say to me that I find tricky. I was recommended by a friend to download the 24/7 Prayer Movement app *Lectio 365*; I find it both encouraging and enlightening each day and would recommend it. It has a morning and evening session – the evening session especially is very nice to listen to before you go to sleep.

In addition to this, recently Waverley Abbey (now home of the 24/7 Prayer Movement) has launched a new app entitled *Every Day with Jesus* and I find it so encouraging; I would highly recommend you to give it a try. Not only does it give you a daily Bible verse and devotion, it suggests an action you can take based on the Bible reading, it includes prayer and gives you a small list of Bible readings for further study. You can also 'share' the whole session with another i-phoner! I often share what I've read with my friends as an encouragement. Sometimes I genuinely feel the devotion I am reading or listening to was written specifically for me. For instance, today's devotion is based on Colossians 4: 2-6 '*Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone*'. A reminder to always speak kindly to one another even when you may face unkindness.

I hope you'll give one or both of the apps a try and maybe share with friends or family a session that has particularly spoken to you.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

Disposing of the cremated remains of a loved one requires serious thought: in a cemetery, in an urn on the mantelpiece, at a beauty spot or at sea? There are many scenarios and the latest is in the upper atmosphere by using a balloon to rise to approximately 100,000 ft or 19 miles. A picture of your loved one is attached to an urn and at the release of the ashes this is photographed incorporating both.

Sunday church attendance is 80% of that in 2019 and has more than halved since 1987. Almost 300 parishes have disappeared in the last five years, the fastest rate since records began in 1960. Last month saw the first Church in Wales' "microservice" to help worshippers "find peace in a troubled world". This is held in Penllergaer every Monday at 4:45pm and is no longer than 15 minutes so workers on the way home can call into church, find a space for peace and quiet, prayer and reflection. Other churches are having evening Compline service (Tonbridge), a 15 minute service on a Tuesday regarding conflict zones (Wolverhampton) or, in Sheffield, a contemplation service.

On 4th April 2024, Bristol Cathedral invited multiple faiths to celebrate the Grand Iftar which marks the end of daily fasting during Ramadan and is open to non-Muslims. The event was organised by Muslims4Bristol in partnership with the Cathedral and also Bridges for Communities. This event started in 2017 following the Manchester Arena bombing, to promote peace and unity.

Dr Martin Schoyen has a collection of 20,000 manuscripts, of which 400 pieces are connected to the Bible. Many are be sold, including the *Crosby-Schoyen Codex*, a collection of early Christian texts from North Africa which contains the oldest complete versions of



two books of the Bible from around the 3rd Century AD. These manuscripts are vital evidence of the Judaeo-Christian tradition that existed at the time. They are written in the Coptic language on papyrus and contain the first complete versions of the *Book of Jonah* and the *First Epistle of Peter*, written before the conversion in 312 AD of Emperor Constantine. The pre-auction value of the *Codex* alone is up to £3 million. The auction is at Christie's on 11 June 2024.


The Coventry branch of The Choir with No Name meets weekly at Central Hall, providing a lifeline, a safe space for people to make friends and to combat loneliness. Its vision is that no-one should face mental health, poverty and homelessness alone. Currently the 30 members, besides singing in a community atmosphere, enjoy a free hot meal. The charity Global has given £2.6 million for projects in local communities across the UK and this choir has been awarded £63,700, which should cover its expenses for the next two years.

Please have a word with me if you'd like to volunteer or want to know more – age is no barrier to having fun and helping children know Jesus! Thank you.



The D-Day Normandy Landings

Eighty years ago, on 6th June 1944, the D-Day Normandy Landings took place. More than 150,000 Allied troops landed on the beaches of Normandy. The Battle of Normandy ended on 25th August with an Allied victory.

The question of what the *D* stood for has never been absolutely determined: some say it just stood for Day; others maintain it was Disembarkation, because it was an

amphibious operation. What is sure is that there was a spiritual dimension. General Eisenhower, the commander of Operation Overlord, urged those taking part to "beseech the blessing of Almighty God upon this great and noble undertaking", and President Roosevelt broadcast a prayer to the nation – the United States, that is.



Before June 5 – the original date for D-Day, before bad weather forced a rethink – a massive and successful series of deceptions was put in place to make the Nazis think the invasion would come elsewhere. The Germans were certainly confused. Hitler, thinking the attack was a feint, refused to send reinforcements, and their strategy was hampered by the absence of their brilliant Commander Erwin Rommel, who was on leave.

Nevertheless, the Americans suffered over 2,000 casualties at Omaha Beach, which was the most heavily defended. Altogether it was reckoned that over 4,000 Allied troops were killed, but about 156,000 successfully stormed the beaches and many landed behind the lines, including American paratrooper Private John Steele, who descended on to the pinnacle of the church tower in Sainte-Mère-Église, the first village to be liberated by the US Army. Lit up by searchlights, he survived by pretending to be dead, was captured and then escaped, joining the invading soldiers.

This year handmade silhouettes of almost 1,500 servicemen were transported to Normandy for an art installation, *Standing with Giants*, to mark the anniversary.



God Made Activity Book – Science activities celebrating God's creation By Lizzie Henderson and Steph Bryant, SPCK £6.99

This children's book is a fun-filled science sticker activity book celebrating God's creation.

The 20 pages of scenes and activities engage children in celebrating the creativity and diversity of all that God made with over 30 large stickers of animals, planets and natural features.

Activities include observing the moon and stars on a starry night, charting the weather, using stickers for a pre-historic animals' scene (including dinosaurs), collecting and identifying the great variety of leaves, going on a minibeast search expedition, identifying the planets of the solar system, growing vegetables to eat, and matching animals to their habitats using stickers.

The 'God Made' series encourages young children to explore and discover more about the world around them, and tells them about the loving God who made it all. Written in collaboration with The Faraday Institute for Science and Religion, this series of picture books – God Made Space, God Made the World and God Made Animals – and activities is an ideal way to help children engage with and celebrate God and His universe. 
Food for the Journey Bible Themes: 365-Day Devotional Various Authors, Edited Elizabeth McQuoid, IVP, £25.99





WORDSEARCH

Erasmus, patron saint of sailors

Do you like messing about in boats? If so, then you'll have heard of St Elmo's Fire. It is the light that is sometimes seen on mastheads of boats after storms at sea. St Elmo is another name for St Erasmus, a fourth century Syrian bishop who was not afraid of violent storms. Legend has it that one day when Erasmus was preaching outside, a thunderbolt hit the ground right beside him. That might have distracted modern bishops, but not Erasmus – he just kept on preaching. His courage won him the respect of sailors, who made him their patron saint. Erasmus finally died during the Diocletian persecutions in 300AD, and his feast day is 2nd June.
