

Dear Friends

Be very careful, then, how you live—not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity, because the days are evil. [Ephesians 5:15-16]

Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom. [Psalms 90:12]



These two scriptures talk to us about TIME!

As much as we don't like to think about it, our days on earth are limited. Yes, as Christians, we have the privilege of being saved and the blessing of eternal life – the guarantee of spending eternity with the Lord. How glorious! However, we have a clock on our lives and with this awareness, God desires us to place great value on our time.

How do we spend most of our time? Is it school, work, family commitments, taking care of the home, making time for friends, leisure activities? Our busy daily schedules and routines make it easy to make God just an add-on in our lives. We love Him but somehow, other things are prioritised; they seem more important, imminent and urgent. "God can wait – He is not demanding like all the other things I have to deal with," we say to ourselves. That's the assumption we can make – if we don't walk closely with God and are not in a relationship with Him.

When you look at your life and schedule, no matter how impossible or challenging spending time with God might seem, you will make time for God if He is important to you. In Matthew 6:33, it says: "But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

Here, the Lord is saying that you must seek Him first. 'First' means 'coming before all others' and also 'foremost in position, rank or importance'. God wants to be at the top of the priority list, not at the bottom, not even in the middle. When we do this, a blessing accompanies it. He says, "And all these things will be added to you," which includes all our anxieties about our daily needs. God knows what we need; all we need to do is pursue His Kingdom and righteousness. He will take care of everything else. Child of God, trust His word and His promises!

Making this shift is not always easy – it takes discipline and the Holy Spirit's help. How can we make time for God a habit and embed this time into our already busy and crammed routines and everyday lives? A big part of this includes learning to bring our time under control. In Jesus, we have the perfect example – He was exemplary at bringing His time under control. Do you know, there is nowhere in scripture where we find that Jesus was in a hurry, was against time or didn't have enough time? Nowhere!

On the contrary, He was very unhurried. What strikes me particularly when I study the life of Jesus is that He was present in every moment – in whatever He was doing; so much so, in John 11:1-7, He didn't even allow the death of His close friend Lazarus to change His focus or pace.

Wouldn't you agree that we need to follow Jesus' example? We must slow down, control our time, and reorder our priorities. Let's put God in His rightful place – put Him first and in the centre of our lives. Let's give Him our love, our time, our attention. He deserves it! As you do so, I pray that God will continue to care for you, bless, protect and provide for you in Jesus' Name.

Notes from Elders' Meeting, June 2024

- Elders noted that the new arrangements for Room Bookings and the reorganisation of Junior Church had gone smoothly.
- Pastor Sherry gave details of new initiatives she was setting up as part of her targets following her appointment; these include Passion for Prayer, a 30-minute session for private or shared prayer at 6.00-6.30pm on Thursday evenings commencing 27th June. The Sitting Room now functions as a Prayer Room as well as meeting space, and all are invited to visit for private prayer. Visitor forms and welcome packs to be given to any visitors to morning or evening worship. Sherry hopes to drop in on Home Groups, and she will be producing sets of questions based on her sermons for discussion material for the groups if they wish to use them. Sherry will be spending an hour each week (probably Monday from 11am - 12 noon) out in the community visiting local streets and places, spreading the Gospel with the people she hopes to meet and inviting them to church. Sherry also hopes to organise a course 'Coffee Morning to Sunday Morning' where people can explore the use of 'Talking Point – 200 Christian question cards for inspirational conversations to explore faith'. These cards will be on the tables at coffee mornings where it is hoped they will stimulate discussion led by those who have attended the course. Further details on all these initiatives will be available from Sherry or via the Sunday Notice Sheet and leaflets you will find in church.
- Apart from one or two snagging items, the Apse is now complete. The T-loop will be restored during the week commencing 17th June. A discussion took place concerning improvements to the audio-visual aspect, but opinion was divided as to the way forward. Hopefully, a small group can be set up to review what is required and bring a proposal to church meeting.

- Elders' election: nominations closed on 9th June and the election process moves to the next stage which is approaching the nominees to ask if they are willing to stand in the election.
- It was agreed to continue with the current arrangements for morning Communion, where people collect their bread and wine on entering the Sanctuary. The presiding minister will serve people during evening worship.
- The account for the new boilers at Baginton Road has now been settled.
- M&M discussions are still ongoing.
- Baginton Road manse: a proposal will be put to the AGM asking members to consider its future.
- There will be a Fire Drill sometime in the next few weeks.
- HOPE Coventry is celebrating ten years of being in operation and to mark this
 milestone they are asking churches to share coffee and cakes. We will be
 taking part on Tuesday 2nd and Thursday 4th July when cakes will be available
 for a donation which will go to HOPE Coventry.
- Reports from the various groups and committees were tabled.
- Pastor Sherry has completed Advanced Safeguarding Training.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

Hearsall Baptist Church has now been sold to Genesis International Christian Centre who worship under the name MARPE Assembly of All Nations; they currently meet in a rented building in the Rowley's Green area of Coventry. They have promised that the Christmas star will be lit as it has been since the late 1940s. The Hearsall congregation have moved to Holyhead Road URC (now called Sherbourne Community Church).

Conspiracy theories abound concerning the missing 15th century panel which was stolen in 1934 from St Bravo's Cathedral, Ghent, Belgium. It was part of the Adoration of the Mystic Lamb by the Van Eyck brothers. Another panel, stolen at the same time, was recovered from the left-luggage office at Brussels North station after the applicable ticket was received by the church authorities. The investigation was not helped by the cathedral organist suffering a heart attack, with his last words being that 'he



was only one who knew', plus something about desk, key, cupboard and insurance; also, a judge who ruled "there is no negotiation with thieves". The panels have been described as Belgium's Sistine Chapel and a local filmmaker hopes to show a

mystery film based on fact and fiction next year. The latest conspiracy theory is that the missing panel is intact and held by an influential Flemish family.

A study of babies' names over the last two years has shown a decrease in Charles with Noah becoming popular. Since then, there has been an increase in rainfall and global warnings!!

Church of England attendance in 2023 is up 5% but there are still 170,000 fewer worshippers than before the pandemic. Could the C of E (and us) learn from the German Lutherans in Heidelberg who have a similar problem but have incorporated Taylor Swift songs into services? This has attracted Gen Z students and as a priest



who listened to her 11 albums said: "I think the church still has good answers to the important questions. But they are often packaged in a way that the younger generations do not understand." Taylor Swift's activism for LGBT rights was praised, as was her distancing herself from Donald Trump. There was also praise for her song *Christmas*

Must be Something More with its reference to "Jesus Christ who saved our lives" and her song about her mother's cancer Soon You'll Get Better. Services have previously included music by Michael Jackson, Madonna and Bob Dylan but these have not been so popular. So, roll over Beethoven and become a Swiftie!

In April 2024 it was reported that mysterious "drops of blood" were spotted on a statue of the Virgin and Child that was positioned behind an iron grille in a stone grotto in Ostro, Germany. An investigation was started, led by a Professor of Applied Zoology at Dresden University. The red markings were found to be red spider-like mites which had responded to the rising spring temperatures by climbing to higher points which explained why they could be seen on the heads of the statue, giving the illusion of blood when viewed from a distance.

Over 150 years ago (1870) a Methodist group in New Jersey, USA, purchased a mile-square plot of land which included a beach. Access to the beach was blocked betwixt 9am and noon on Sundays during the 15 weeks of summer. The State Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) issued a violation letter stating this blockage was illegal as it cut off access to the ocean, which was public land. The DEP ordered that the Methodist group should remove the barriers or be fined up to \$25,000 for each day that the beach was closed. The group has now temporarily allowed beachgoers access on Sunday holiday weekends while it continues to fight the court case.

Church of England senior clergy have been seen abseiling in aid of local charities. In Leominster the non-hazardous 100ft drop down the priory tower was sponsored by Co-op Funeralcare!

Falun Gong

At a Thursday Coffee Morning some weeks ago, China came up in conversation and how we know very little about what goes on in that country. I mentioned Falun Gong and how people who practise it have been imprisoned and then killed to harvest their organs. No one at the Coffee Morning had heard of Falun Gong, so I said I would try to write something about it for *Connections*.

I first found out about Falun Gong when a Chinese lady came up to me and asked if I would sign a petition in support of Falun Gong, which I did and she gave me a leaflet explaining about the organ harvesting. It made horrific reading and I wrote an article about it for the *Messenger*, the magazine of Warwick Road URC, and also a letter to *Reform*, the URC magazine. Over the past seven years I have never seen anything mentioned in the news about Falun Gong, so it's no wonder few people have heard of it. Here is a brief outline of Falun Gong and what is going on in China.

In 1992, Falun Gong, a new Buddhist movement, began to sweep China; it is a traditional Chinese Qigong practice promoting self-improvement of one's physical, mental emotional and spiritual well-being. As a dictatorship, the Chinese Communist Party fears groups it does not control; to maintain its grip on the country, it creates an atmosphere of fear by persecuting any independent group.



When in 1998 a government survey showed that 100 million people were practising Falun Gong in China – more than the Chinese Communist Party's membership – the Party leader Jiang Zemin banned Falun Gong, fearing the Party's power was threatened.

In China innocent prisoners of conscience are used as a living organ donor bank. They are killed on demand and their organs are sold for a large profit. The majority are Falun Gong practitioners, who are considered to have healthier organs because they meditate, exercise and have a peaceful way of life.


Although we hear nothing about Falun Gong on the News, there is a vast amount on line. For anyone who is interested, go to – www.EndOrganPillaging.org.

I have recently found out on good authority, that China is not the only country killing people to harvest their organs – Nigeria is another one. I wonder how many more unscrupulous countries are involved in this practice. If you would like a copy of the leaflet I have, let me know.

If seafarers seem irrelevant to your daily life, think again: 90 per cent of everything you buy in the shops comes to you by sea. Merchant seafarers quite literally keep our global economy afloat. Yet it is a tough life, far from loved ones. Merchant ships are harsh working environments, never mind the threat of piracy or even shipwreck. To help the seafarers, a worldwide network of port chaplains has sprung up. They offer hospitality and friendship, as well as practical, emotional and spiritual support, providing almost a 'home from home' in hundreds of ports, in more than 50 countries. There are three well-known societies: The Mission to Seafarers (Anglican), The Apostolate of the Sea (Roman Catholic), and The Sailors' Society (inter-denominational).




