#### Dear Friends

Forgiveness can often be challenging for us. We hold on to grudges because of the emotional pain, hurt and betrayal associated with the offences we have had to endure. We may even find it more difficult when the person who has hurt us does it intentionally or fails to admit to wrongdoing.

This month, I have one question I'd like you to reflect on: how can we be true and faithful followers of Christ and find it hard to forgive? Most especially when Jesus forgave us and calls us to forgive those who sin against us or hurt us. Discovering this supernatural call to let go and forgive is vital to grow in spiritual maturity. It is more for our benefit than for the persons who have hurt us.

Unforgiveness and the wounds that come from offence and hurt can make you feel bitter, resentful, angry and even lead you to hatred – a path causing you to exhibit feelings contrary to those of the fruit of the Spirit. It says in Galatians 5:22-23: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control." Why do you think we are encouraged to forgive as often as possible in the Word of God?

Matthew 18:21-22 says: "Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, 'Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother or sister who sins against me? Up to seven times?' Jesus answered, 'I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times.'"

In Luke 17:3-4, it says: "So watch yourselves. If your brother or sister sins against you, rebuke them; and if they repent, forgive them. Even if they sin against you seven times in a day and seven times come back to you saying, 'I repent,' you must forgive them."

People around us will always offend, insult, and hurt us (not always intentionally); but the Lord will not necessarily prevent this from happening just because you are His child. It is a test of your character, followership, obedience and transformation when you can walk in the footsteps of Jesus. Remember, Christ's death was a sacrificial death of love, and right to the very end, He held nothing against those who betrayed Him, spat on Him, hurled insults at Him, tortured Him, and even killed Him. Instead, Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." [Luke 23:34]. Can you genuinely follow His example? God wants to see if you can forgive like Him.

You can pray one million times a day that God should not let anyone insult or offend you ever again, and I can guarantee that is a prayer that will not be heard or answered. Why? Throughout scripture, we see the will of God; instead of God removing offence, God calls His people not to be offended and to overcome offence. Proverbs 19:11 says: "A person's wisdom yields patience; it is to one's glory to overlook an offence." We are to overlook offence and refuse to be people who are

easily offended. This means taking no notice of the wrongs people do against you, letting it go, refusing to retaliate or take revenge. For me, the best word for this is 'forgive.' Jesus expects us to overcome with love and forgiveness.

Apostle Paul goes a step further and not only overlooks offence, but delights in it for the sake of Christ. Look at his words in 2 Corinthians 12:10: "That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong."

We need to learn how to forgive, and the easiest way is to remember that Christ has forgiven you. Ephesians 4:32 tells us: "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you." All the sins and wrongs you have ever done and will do, Jesus died for you in your place, took your punishment, the punishment you deserved, and forgave you. Your slate was wiped clean. When He sees you, He no longer counts your sins against you because He loves you. This is the love of Christ. He expects us to see people and not count their sins against them; learn to wipe the slate clean and give people another chance, not condemn them and write them off for life. Jesus said in Luke 6:37: "Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven."

"Forgive" is God's command to us! I pray that the Lord will give you the strength to forgive those who have wronged you. May you move into your place of freedom as you obey this call in Jesus' name.

We have recently had our 5 year electrical survey carried out by Coventry Electrical. All five buildings are legally required to have this assessment carried out every five years.

Wonderful to report that a relative of one of the senior solicitors at Davisons Law, the tenant at 12 Warwick Row, has joined Clare's team of volunteers for Open Doors Café – an unexpected and lovely 'spin off' from the working relationship with our next-door tenant.

Winter is on the horizon, and we are keen to ensure that the central heating system is up and running properly in the church after major upgrading work carried out on the boiler over the last two years. Fingers and everything else crossed!

A new 'bus gate' is being installed in Greyfriars Road which should not affect us too much. We have received confirmation that deliveries and drop-off arrangements outside the Centre are unaffected.

# NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

This year the grounds of King's College, Cambridge became a wildflower meadow which was recently harvested using equipment pulled by horses and the hay was offered to local farmers. For centuries the hay of a churchyard was considered part of the stipend of the clergy.

A funambulist 50 years ago walked on a tightrope 1,300ft above ground between the twin towers of the then World Trade Centre. In August 2024, Philippe Petit walked down the nave of New York's cathedral, St John the Divine, on a tightrope to commemorate this achievement. He also changes the bulbs in the chandeliers of the cathedral twice a year, as he claims he has a head for heights.



The Right Reverend Timothy Dudley Smith, a prolific hymn writer, has died aged 97. His most popular hymn is *Tell out, my soul, the greatness of the Lord.* This is a modern language version of the *Magnificat* that came to him in 1961when he was reading a review of the New English Bible. Set to the soaring tune *Woodlands* by Walter Greatorex, it has appeared in over 220 hymn books. John Betjeman described it in 1976 as "one of the very few hymns really to establish themselves in recent years". Timothy Dudley Smith wrote over 400 hymns and his last book was published in 2019.

A service to commemorate Carlo Acutis was held at Walsingham, Norfolk, this summer. The London-born teenager died from leukaemia in 2006 aged 15, and is to be named a saint by the Roman Catholic Church. He will be canonised as the first saint from the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

The late Pope Benedict once described the ancient pilgrimage route of the Camino de Santiago as a spiritual embodiment of the old continent's rich culture, art and hospitality. Today, residents are not happy with the pilgrims because of their abuse of hospitality, such as the taking of crops from the fields, unmonitored fires and jumping naked uninvited into swimming pools. In 2020, 54,000 pilgrims arrived at the shrine of the Apostle James; there were more than 440,000 in 2023.

Church heating not working? Boiler deceased? Provide prayer blankets, says the Net Zero Campaign leader of the Church of England: "It is not worth keeping old buildings warm for limited use".

The Amish people came from Switzerland to America in the 18<sup>th</sup> Century as they believed that the Bible stated they must live separately to maintain purity of belief. We know of them still using horse and cart for transport and ploughing their fields using mule and plough. The use of microwaves and dishwashers is regulated and the using of a PC is allowed without internet connection. In 2000, a Bishop accepted that solar power was natural if kept separate from mains electricity but debate still

rages in the Amish community over whether this is "God's grid" or "the mark of the beast". However, solar panels are being accepted with the use of solar cars, lawnmowers, etc. "Solar power is an enabler and a catalyst."

When asked whether he was high church or low church a Bishop replied that he was short church. To a similar question, a vicar's response was "One God, one Church, one hour".


# The Poetry of Pilgrimage: Reflections on Celtic Pilgrimage sites in Ireland and Britain

## Annual Will Aid Campaign



Have you made your Will? A survey by the national Will-writing charity Will Aid has revealed that 59% of UK adults do not have paperwork in place to protect their loved ones after they are gone. The poll of 2,200 people across the country also showed that only 29% had an up-to-date Will, with the majority admitting they haven't got anything in place at all.

Many participants cited cost as their reason for not instructing a solicitor to write a Will on their behalf, while others said that time was a factor or they were simply reluctant to think about the end of their life and had therefore postponed writing a Will.

The annual Will Aid campaign sees solicitors across the UK volunteering their time to write Wills throughout November. The campaign is run collaboratively by seven leading charities: Age UK, British Red Cross, Christian Aid, NSPCC, Save the Children, SCIAF and Trocaire. It raises vital funds for these causes, while ensuring that people in the UK gain the reassurance of knowing they have a professionally-written Will.

Under the scheme, participating solicitors waive their fee for writing basic Wills. Instead, they invite clients to make a voluntary donation to Will Aid – a suggested £100 for a single basic Will and £180 for a pair of basic 'mirror' Wills.

The Will Aid website has details of how to contact a participating solicitor, plus guides on how to write a Will and a Will Planner: https://www.willaid.org.uk/.

In Warwickshire, you can also take advantage of Myton Hospices' Make a Will Week that takes place in March each year. A number of reputable local solicitors give their time free of charge to write or update basic Wills for Myton supporters, in return for a donation to the Myton Hospices.
