

#### Dear Friends

The joy of the Lord is your strength! [Nehemiah 8:10]

Our life journey is often faced with challenges, obstacles and trials being thrown our way, as well as unannounced and unexpected experiences that seek to shape and change the course of our lives. What challenges or difficulties are you going through right now? What is causing you pain, frustration or sorrow? What is trying to rob your joy or has taken away your smile? Maybe you feel like you once had joy and have lost it; it's gone.



This month, I want to encourage you with a reminder of God's Word. The Lord desires to restore your joy, confidence, laughter and smile. He wishes to restore joy in all areas of your life. If, as you are reading this, you see joy as a hope and dream we can have in the distant future, I want to encourage you that joy is for today, it is for the present, and it is for now!

God wants you to know that real joy cannot be taken away from you; it is there forever!

In John 15:11, Jesus said: "I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete." Isn't that an amazing truth? God's joy is in us, and it is complete!

Some translations use the words "that your joy may be full." The joy God gives you is not given half-measured but you are filled with it. Look at Jesus' words in John 17:13: He says "so that they may have the full measure of my joy within them". The joy that you have is not temporary; it is permanent and remains in you always.

God wants you to know that joy is not determined by your personality or your circumstances, but your joy stems from Jesus. It is a joy that comes from knowing and serving Him – your relationship with Him. It is a deep, abiding joy from knowing that God loves you.

If you struggle to find joy, I want to show you how to find it in God's Word:

• Firstly, it is found in the presence of God. Psalm 16:11 says: "You make known to me the path of life; you will fill me with joy in your presence, with eternal pleasures at your right hand." Remember, you can have as much of Jesus' presence as you desire. Why? Because Jesus' presence lives inside of you. The Holy Spirit is the continuous presence of God that fills you with overflowing joy. Galatians 5:22 tells us the fruit of the Holy Spirit is joy.

Secondly, you need to have the right viewpoint and perspective. James 1: 2 says: "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds." The key word in this verse for me is 'consider', which means "to believe to be or think of as". It all stems down to your perspective. It all depends on how you consider things and how you face them. You can consider each trial you face as joy and rejoice with joy inexpressible.

The New Living Translation of this verse uses the words: "when troubles of any kind come your way", and the Message Translation says: "when tests and challenges come at you from all sides". Would you agree that finding joy amid trials and rejoicing in the face of hardship is another dimension and level? It is supernatural. Most of us are looking and searching for joy away from our challenges, away from troubles, but remember, as this verse reminds us, there is joy in all circumstances.

How can you find joy in the midst of painful experiences and hardships? It is through the understanding that the joy the world gives is not the same joy that the Holy Spirit gives. God's joy empowers you to face difficulties, overcome obstacles, and persevere in your faith in the face of adversity.

God calls you to be an outshining of His joy in the world – through the joy of the message you bring of the gospel of Jesus Christ and as an outward expression of His joy. May you continue to embrace the fullness of joy found in God's presence.

# Secretary's Remarks, AGM 2024



I became Acting Church Secretary in 2015 during a period of vacancy; Sue M then took on the role until 2017 when I took over the reins once more. During the past seven years we appointed Reverend Yvonne as our Minister, which meant for the first time in its history, West Orchard was part of a joint pastorate with Warwick Road URC. We faced two years of Covid and all its associated problems, the strange world of Zoom meetings, streamed worship, social distancing and weekly newsletters. This was followed by the proposal to explore merging our two

churches and forming a new pastorate here on the Baginton Road site. Both churches agreed and the first service of BR URC was held in February 2022. Reverend Yvonne then retired and once again we were in vacancy, though ably supported by Reverend Peter and the Elders.

In April of this year, we welcomed our new Pastor, Sherry, and her family and so began the next chapter of this new church here at BR. Already we are facing changes and I have to say I feel a real buzz among all who pass through our doors, particularly on a Sunday. Exciting times are ahead, God has much for us to do!

Colleagues who have served on the Eldership have been telling me for the past year and a half that I should consider handing over and taking a break. This is something I have been reluctant to do as I felt stability and continuity were important during our early days of working together as a new fellowship. Now it is time for a change – this year, for the first time since pre-Covid days, we have been able to hold an election to appoint Elders. I'm delighted that we have 11 people who will assist Sherry and Peter in their work here at BR URC. Sue D has offered to take over as Church Secretary and I am stepping aside to become Assistant Church Secretary. Over the next few weeks Sue and I will work together and look at the various tasks and share them between us. If this proves a successful way of working, the appointment of Assistant Secretary will continue.

During my time as Church Secretary, I have been fortunate to have the support of a fantastic group of Elders who have given so much time and support during the highs and lows of the past seven years – because of them, my job has been made a lot easier. Thank you to all those Elders, trustees and committee members who are standing down after tonight, your contribution to the life of BR is very much appreciated and valued. Finally, thank you to all of you wonderful people for your love throughout and your prayers and support when the going got tough, I hope you feel I have served you well.

# Hymns of Yesterday

Earlier this year, the former Archbishop of Canterbury, Lord Williams of Oystermouth, wrote an article stating that, in his opinion, the great classic hymns have fallen out of common memory, even though people are looking for something to "nourish the soul".

Selection of hymns at weddings and funerals were often chosen because people vaguely remembered those from their primary school days. Was this because fewer hymns were being sung in schools or even football matches?

He asked whether the clergy were not wanting to "solo perform" when guests do not know the tune to lesser-known but appropriate hymns. The Archbishop said a good hymn is one that does two things: it has interesting words and images, giving you metaphors and pictures to think with, which are vivid and unusual; it also takes you on a bit of a journey and tells you a bit of a story as it unfolds. Charles Wesley's hymns such as Love Divine, All Loves Excelling and Come, O Thou Traveller Unknown are great classics worth singing and thinking about.

Rowan Williams called upon priests to encourage children at local schools and religious education teachers to explore singing and chanting, noting that every religious community is very serious about music. He went on to refer to Robbie Williams' *Angels* and Leonard Cohen's *Hallelujah*. Since his article, Taylor Swift songs are being considered suitable for church services.

The Revd Christine Smith, at Hymns Ancient and Modern, says that in many cases new lyrics have been written for well-known melodies such as *Morning Has Broken* and *I Vow to Thee My Country*, thus allowing people to sing familiar tunes with new words.

The Revd Robert Canham of the Hymn Society says "we should give thanks that, after 175 years, *All Things Bright and Beautiful* still speaks to people today". An organist recalls being delayed in traffic and found the service had started with the congregation singing this hymn unaccompanied.

The question arrives of: what is a hymn? Is it poetry or prose that has a tune composed for it, or a tune for which words have been composed? The poem *Oh Happy Day was* written by Dr Doddridge in the 18<sup>th</sup> century; the tune came a century later and then was adapted in the 20<sup>th</sup> century for the Edwin Hawkins Singers.

My favourite hymn that, I believe, is effective both as a prayer or sung is *Be still for the presence of the Lord, the Holy one is here*. Do you have a favourite hymn? Why not request it, sung or said.

If was a week of fun, laughter and teaching as the children learnt about Jesus through stories of some of His miracles and parables. #### Commitment for Life 2024/25 - Zimbabwe

The headline for the 2024-25 campaign is "Resilience and Hope" and for Zimbabwe, we must add in – goats! Just how valuable are goats? Depends on the country and the era, you might say: before coins were used for money, goats were traded for silver, they were so valuable; during biblical times, goatskins were used as parchment for writing, and early explorers used goatskins as water containers when they travelled – Mahatma Gandhi consumed goats' milk every day for 30 years.

So back to Zimbabwe. How valuable are goats to the local people now? For the last few years, Zimbabwe has continued to experience unstable, unpredictable climate conditions. This year has reached a tragic peak – in April, the President of Zimbabwe declared a drought emergency and forecast a £2 billion need for humanitarian aid.

Farmers like Sekai Mazarura, a local farmer, married with 7 children, has admitted sadly that: "Drought has killed our crops, shorter rainy season comes too late, 30 days without rain in our growing season."

Farming is the primary livelihood. No yield = no income = no food. This poses a significant risk to women and children, often vulnerable to exploitation in their desperation to provide the next meal.

However, through the BRACT programme\*, thanks to our donations, Sekai has learned to plant smaller, more climate resilient, nutritious grains, rather than the traditional maize crops; also, he has been able to diversify his livestock, having

learned how to choose and breed Boer cross goats. Livestock is crucial for farmers to store wealth, especially in a volatile economic climate.

Sekai explains how his goats thrive: "Unlike local goats, I have to look after the Boer cross kids very carefully, giving the right vaccinations and worm treatments. The kids mature early and there is more meat on the adults." The price these goats fetch is much higher than for local goats: £27 - £31 compared to £19, so the cost of medication is more than compensated for. This means less stress about drought and income. Sekai emphasises how people are now working more together, sharing the BRACT knowledge and practice and passing on livestock. This diversification is benefiting the whole community. Such is the value of goats in Zimbabwe!

Thanks to BRACT-funded training and despite adverse conditions, families are persevering and adapting to the current precarious economic situation. Please support their resilience and unwavering hope during our Appeal in September.

# Special Cause for September and October - Mercy Ships



The idea for this special cause charity came out of a discussion at Tuesday Home Group. Please leave donations in the box at the back of Church.

Mercy Ships is a global Christian charity that follows the 2,000-year-old model of Jesus to bring hope and healing to those suffering from disability,

disfigurement, and disease. They deploy hospital ships and partner with African nations to transform surgical systems and provide free surgery to those most in need. They believe every person is valuable.

In low-income and lower middle-income countries, nine out of ten people have no access to basic surgical care. Their charity hospital ships sail directly to these people to offer the medical care they need – for free. Since 1978, medical missions by Mercy Ships have worked with compassion in more than 56 nations, providing services worth over £1.2 billion that have helped more than 2.8 million people. Their current focus is on sub-Saharan Africa.


# Pastoral News

# Mission, Outreach and Worship Report for September 2024

**Church Membership**: During August's Holy Communion service (18<sup>th</sup>), I had the privilege of welcoming Audrey Potts, Graham and Sue Coles into church membership. If you are not currently a church member but regularly attend Sunday worship, could I ask you to seriously consider and pray about becoming a member of Baginton Road URC.



Leadership and pastoral care in a church are generally shared by ministers and Elders who are elected by church members. The congregations hold Church Meetings which are usually open to all, but at which only church members may vote. Prayer and discussion take place before important decisions are made.

Members are encouraged to share in the life of the local church. Most do this by participating in weekly worship, attending Church Meetings, contributing financially to the work of the church, and taking part in its activities. If you feel you might want to become a member of a local church and would like to know more, have a word with the minister, an Elder or another member, who will be only too happy to advise you and guide you through the process. If you would like to be a part of shaping the continuing life of the United Reformed Church, we warmly welcome you.

We are in a time of much decline in church attendance / membership, with most of the nationally-recognised traditional denominations reporting smaller and smaller numbers worshipping in churches on Sunday morning.

One of the consequences of smaller church membership in the URC is that the stipendiary ministry to support churches is becoming increasingly stretched and our denomination is having to make difficult decisions regarding the placement of

ministers. This is something we know only too well about here in Coventry, where in future the five churches of Baginton Road, Foleshill, Ansty Road, Keresley, and Sherbourne Community Church will be served by just one full-time minister; and in the whole of Coventry and Warwickshire, some 15 churches will be served by just two and a half ministers after 2028.

I am making a plea to those of you amongst our congregation who have yet to make the step towards formal church membership, to pray about it, and to seriously consider becoming a member of the URC because more than ever it truly matters.

But, not only does church membership matter in term of a position within the denomination, it also matters to God. God calls us all into oneness with him. We are all called to become and play our part in the body of Christ (the church); however small you may feel that part may be. I assure you that it is a vital part.

I would encourage you to read 1 Corinthians 12-14: Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body – whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free – and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many.

Sherry and I are holding a church membership session on 3<sup>rd</sup> September between 10am – 12noon; we would encourage you to come and discuss becoming a church member.

**Bounce and Play**: this will start again on 11<sup>th</sup> September. Fourteen families from Bounce and Play joined us for our holiday clubs; we are struggling for volunteers on a Wednesday morning, please contact me if you are able to offer some of your valuable time.

**Holy Communion at Home**: I have been asked to reach out to those who can no longer get to church and offer them an opportunity to receive Holy Communion. If you know someone who would appreciate receiving Holy Communion please get in touch with me.

**Agenda-less worship**: We have restarted Tuesday evening worship time with the help of Kings Church, Christchurch, and Quinton Park. We are taking a holiday in August so agenda-less worship will return on 24<sup>th</sup> September at 7:30pm at Baginton Road Church.

# NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

The landscape behind the Mona Lisa painting has been solved, claims an American geologist and Renaissance scholar who has studied the travel notebooks of the artist. Visible are Lake Como in Italy with the Alpine peaks overlooking Lecco plus the 14<sup>th</sup>C Azone Visconti bridge.

In 1749 Benjamin Franklin invented the lightning rod. Church leaders vehemently opposed installing lightning rods because they were interfering with Divine Will even though these buildings were built at the highest point of a town or village. Bellringers rang the church bells in thunderstorms in the belief that the noise would scare off demons in the sky that were supposed to unleash lightning bolts but, alas, this practice led to many deaths. In 1764 a violent thunderstorm of nearly an hour



of constant claps led to damage to the steeple of Christopher Wren's St Bride's Church in Fleet Street, London, and in Chatham docks HMS Ramillies was hit by a rare case of ball lighting. Eventually King George III decreed that lightning rods used in Britain and the colonies should have rounded ends. It is thought the delay was due to Benjamin Franklin being a signatory of the 1776 American Declaration of Independence.

The Office of National Statistics has advised that marriages in England and Wales in 2022 totalled 246,897, the first increase since 2017.

Malaga has now opened the first Spanish public pet cemetery. Cremation and burial pricing is based on weight, with a counselling service for owners. This town in 1831 inaugurated Spain's first cemetery for Protestants; previously, burials occurred in the beach under the cover of night and standing upright in the sand facing out to sea.

Next year it is estimated that 35 million pilgrims will visit St Peter's Basilica in Rome for a Jubilee to ask for remission from sins. Vatican staff and workers have been advised to cover up visible piercings and tattoos, yet in 2018 the Pope told young believers "Don't be afraid of tattoos ... tattoos indicate belonging".

Research suggests that approximately 200 churches a year change from pews to chair seating.

It is estimated that in Dublin, Ireland, there are over a million Catholics and 197 parishes, yet two of these parishes were forced to merge in July 2024 because of a shortage of priests. The Vocations Director has said they have one trainee priest arriving in September and from the leadership team advice that young people were daunted by making a lifelong commitment to religious duty and they believe in the welcoming of female priests!


# Harvest Lunch

We each share two or three poems – these are usually on a set theme but don't have to be! All are welcome. The next meetings are:




