

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Dear Friends



What a true joy it is as children of God as we enter the Advent season!

The word 'Advent' comes from the Latin *adventus*, which was translated from the Greek word *parousia* (παρουσία) from the New Testament. Parousia means 'arrival', 'presence' or 'coming' and is usually associated with the second coming of Christ. So this season is a call not only to look back in thankfulness and with grateful hearts for Jesus' birth and arrival over 2,000 years ago, but also to look forward in hope and with expectation for His return and second coming.

These three translations of *parousia* summarise this Advent season for us:

Arrival: We give thanks and celebrate the arrival of our Saviour – the beginning of the 'good news' and the beginning of the 'gospel.' The Greek word *euangelion* (εὐαγγέλιον) means 'good news' or 'gospel' in the New Testament, and the Roman Empire used this word to make a grand announcement of an event of significance. We find the word in Luke 2:10 when the angel announced the birth of Jesus to the Shepherds: "But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you **good news** that will cause great joy for everyone. Today in the town of David, a Saviour has been born to you; He is the Messiah, the Lord."

The good news was that Jesus was the long-awaited Messiah. It brings joy to the world! The birth of Jesus Christ was God's gift to the world. And so, as we spend time with our families, friends and loved ones this season, and we share gifts, let us remember that the best gift you can give them is to share the good news of Jesus Christ – who He is and what He came to do, His life and teachings. Bring the gift of the good news of salvation to everyone you meet and encounter this season.

Presence: Isaiah 7:14 says: "Therefore the Lord Himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call Him Immanuel." In Matthew 1:23, we see that Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled, and we are also told the meaning of the name Immanuel: "... they will call Him Immanuel (which means "God with us").

God is with us! God is ever present with us! God is with us always! His promise to us was fulfilled through Christ – what a comfort to know we are never alone.

Coming: Jesus has come and is coming again – Glory to God! He will return for His Church. Let us be expectant for His return. 1 Thessalonians 4:16-17 says: "For the Lord Himself will come down from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever." 1 Corinthians 15:52 tells us it will be "In a flash, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last

trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed."

Prepare yourself for His coming as Matthew 24:44 reminds us: "So you must be ready because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect Him."

Live in anticipation, put in the effort and energy to spend time and connect with Jesus through prayer, reading and studying God's word, committing to worship, serving God, and loving one another.

The one thing I have been genuinely grateful for is coming to know Jesus, truly knowing Him. He has changed my life in so many ways. I cannot express this in words – there are no words but only those imprinted on my heart and in my spirit for Him alone to read. It is the best gift anyone can, or ever has, or ever could give me. Now that we have received Him, the call to action for us all is to share this with others. Remember to share about Christ's arrival, His presence and His Coming this season, and God bless you abundantly as you do.

I pray that as you celebrate Christmas, your hearts overflow with thanksgiving for the ultimate gift of salvation. I am wishing you a joyous New Year in advance.

When addressing the envelopes, please include surnames of the recipients and only post to people who attend Baginton Road Church regularly.


There is no suggested donation for using the service, but when considering how much to give, please take into account the cost of a second-class stamp which is now 85p.

Advent Knitalong 2024

Over the course of Advent, participants are invited to knit a square table mat in DK weight yarn, which can be used, displayed or given as a present on Christmas Day. The exact design of the

table mat is a surprise, as it's a Mystery Knitalong and will be revealed as you knit, but it will feature a design in lace and textured stitches!

Knitters may prefer to work a smaller square in 4ply / fingering weight yarn which would be perfect as a Christmas dishcloth if worked in a cotton yarn. The pattern is the same, regardless of yarn weight.

The Knitalong will follow the format of previous Advent / Lent Knitalongs: the pattern will be laid out across 24 days (1st - 24th December) and each daily chunk of knitting will be accompanied by a Bible verse for reflection as you knit.

What you will need to take part:

For DK yarn, you'll need approximately 40 - 60 grams (90 - 160 metres) in a solid (Christmassy?) colour and 4mm needles - these should ideally be 20 - 30 cm in length, or knitters may choose to use a circular needle.

Knitters who choose to work the square in 4ply weight yarn will need approximately 30 - 45 grams (100 - 160 metres) of yarn and 3.5mm or 3.75mm needles.

The pattern requires knitters to cast on and off, work the basic knit and purl stitches, and some simple lace stitches: K2tog, SSK, YO and CDD – these will be explained in the pattern. The knitting should take an average knitter 10 - 15 minutes each day.

After being awarded the Ted Prize in 2008, Karen Armstrong used the prize money to create *The Charter for Compassion*. This was unveiled the following year. I recommend the Charter to all of us as a basis of how to lead our lives.

The principle of compassion lies at the heart of all religious, ethical and spiritual traditions, calling us always to treat all others as we wish to be treated ourselves. Compassion impels us to work tirelessly to alleviate the suffering of our fellow creatures, to dethrone ourselves from the centre of our world and put another there, and to honour the inviolable sanctity of every single human being, treating everybody, without exception, with absolute justice, equity and respect.

It is also necessary in both public and private life to refrain consistently and empathically from inflicting pain. To act or speak violently out of spite, chauvinism, or self-interest, to impoverish, exploit or deny basic rights to anybody, and to incite hatred by denigrating others — even our enemies — is a denial of our common humanity. We acknowledge that we have failed to live compassionately and that some have even increased the sum of human misery in the name of religion.

We therefore call upon all men and women

- to restore compassion to the centre of morality and religion
- to return to the ancient principle that any interpretation of scripture that breeds violence, hatred or disdain is illegitimate
- to ensure that youth are given accurate and respectful information about other traditions, religions and cultures
- to encourage a positive appreciation of cultural and religious diversity
- to cultivate an informed empathy with the suffering of all human beings, even those regarded as enemies.

We urgently need to make compassion a clear, luminous and dynamic force in our polarized world. Rooted in a principled determination to transcend selfishness, compassion can break down political, dogmatic, ideological and religious boundaries. Born of our deep interdependence, compassion is essential to human relationships and to a fulfilled humanity. It is the path to enlightenment, and indispensable to the creation of a just economy and a peaceful global community.



Christmas Geese

The story is told of a farmer who didn't believe in Jesus. One snowy Christmas Eve, his wife was taking their children to a service at their local church. He refused to come saying: 'Why would God lower Himself to come to Earth as a man? That's ridiculous!' So, they left him at home.

During the evening the winds grew stronger, and the snow turned to a blizzard. He heard a series of loud thumps on the window. In the field near his house, he saw a flock of wild geese. They had been migrating south when they got caught in the snowstorm. They were lost and stranded on his farm, with no food or shelter.

The man wanted to help the geese and so he opened the doors of the barn, hoping they would go inside for shelter. But the geese didn't do anything, despite the man's efforts to move them. He made a breadcrumb trail leading to the barn and tried to shoo them toward the barn, but they only got more scared and scattered.

Nothing he did could get them to go into the barn: 'Why don't they follow me?' Then he realised: 'If only I were a goose and become one of them, then I could save them.'

Finally, he understood the heart of the Christmas message. God has become one of us in Jesus. The eternal creator God has entered time and space as a baby, to show us who God is and how we can know Him.

Saturday 14th December 2024 9.30am – 12.30pm





Medieval Women: In Their Own Words - An Exhibition



The British Library has a major new exhibition depicting the lives, words and works of medieval women.

It focuses principally on women in Europe from about 1100 to 1500AD and ranges across many aspects of their lives – motherhood, medical, their role in society, culture, politics, and their spiritual and

religious lives. Enigmatic English women such as the anchorite Julian of Norwich and the widely-travelled Margery Kempe are covered, with original and rarely-seen manuscripts being displayed.

If you happen to be in London, this exhibition should be well worth visiting. It runs until 2nd March 2025, and tickets cost £17 (adults), £14.50 (over 65s). The British Library is a short (10-minute) walk from Euston Station.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

This year Gaudete Sunday, or the Third Sunday of Advent, will be 15th December. *Gaudete* is the Latin word for 'rejoice'. Based on Luke 2:10-11 is the carol/song by Buryl Red *There is a Great Joy Coming,* which has a powerful baritone opening solo. There is also a song issued by Steeleye Span in 1972 called *Gaudete* which, along with *Pie Jesu* (Lloyd Webber / Requiem Mass) are the only two recordings in Latin to have reached the top ten hit parade. Joy-full learning.

To celebrate the feast of St Francis of Assisi, patron saint of animals, Arundel Cathedral held an animal blessing service in October. St Francis was also the founder of the Franciscans, or the Greyfriars as they are known in England, which Order came to Coventry in 1234.

In 1884 the Sultan of Morocco gave land in Tangier for the erection of a church. A pre-fabricated iron church was shipped out and erected in 28 days, but was replaced a few years later with a crenellated Anglo-Moorish church dedicated to St Andrew. The church is now advertising for an Anglican priest to become a full-time chaplain for a congregation of 20-40+ international visitors. These pre-fabricated churches were also known as "tin tabernacles", often made in Birmingham, and there is one in Corley Moor, near Coventry.

Churches "divert demand" from the NHS worth £8.4bn a year by providing mental health and additional support, plus running food banks and youth clubs, a report has claimed. However, such projects are "dangerously underfunded" and many in the most deprived areas face closure, according to economists at the analytics company State of Life.

The remains of the explorer Christopher Columbus (1451-1506), which are in Seville Cathedral, have been DNA tested. It is now thought he was of Western Mediterranean origin with traits compatible with Jewish origins, but he was working for the Roman Catholic Church.

A leading Bishop is asking if the Church of England is to be sucked down a plug hole with its ambitious plan *Vision and Strategy* to try to double children attending services by 2030, also to create new congregations and boost church diversity. Yearly attendance has recovered since Covid but was still down by 170,000 in 2023.

The American election day 6th November was also the feast day of St Leonard, patron saint of women in labour, diseases of cattle and release of prisoners. The Inauguration date of the new President, 20th January 2025, is the feast day of St Sebastian, patron saint of soldiers, the plague-stricken, athletes, cyclists, archers and disabled people. He was shot by arrows but survived, in the 3rd Century.





Father Christmas is based on St Nicholas, who was born in the 3rd century in the Greek village of Patara, on the southern coast of Turkey. His family were both devout and wealthy, and when his parents died in an epidemic, Nicholas decided to help people. He gave to the needy, the sick, the suffering, and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. As a bishop, he suffered in prison with other bishops under the Emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians. One story of his generosity explains why we hang Christmas stockings today: there was a poor family with three daughters who needed dowries if they were to marry and not be sold into slavery. Nicholas heard of their plight, and tossed three bags of gold into their home through an open window, which landed in stockings or shoes left before the fire to dry. Hence the custom of children hanging out stockings – in the hope of attracting presents of their own from St Nicholas - on Christmas Eve.
