Home Groups and Bible Study 2026

Have you ever thought about joining one of the small groups which meet within the church and wondered what they are all about? Here are some answers to your questions:



Where do they meet? In people's homes or at church in the Prayer Room or on Zoom.

How many people are in each group? Usually between six and eight people, but not everybody can manage to come to every session.

How often do they meet? Some meet weekly, others fortnightly or, for example during Lent, it might be just for a six-week block.

How long are the sessions and what is included? They last about an hour and a half, starting with tea/coffee and a catch up then moving on to the topic for the group.

What topics are covered? These vary and are usually chosen by the members of the group. They will usually follow through a published resource, for example the Study of the Lord's Prayer produced by 24/7 resources, or a Bible Study course. There are some examples in the meeting room if anyone wants to have a look.

Are the groups scary? Not at all! It's just an opportunity to talk more about your faith, ask questions and share answers and thoughts. None of us are experts and you can contribute as much or as little as you want. It's also a great opportunity to get to know members of the congregation better and to be part of a small support network.

When are they held and who do I ask about joining? There are groups meeting on Monday evening, Tuesday evening, a Lent Group is being planned and a Zoom group will meet monthly starting soon. There is also the possibility of a daytime group being formed if people are interested.

Giving Tree - Thank You from CCM

Dear Friend,

Thank you for your help with our Giving Tree Project this Christmas. We have found we are helping more and more local children each year and were expecting an increase from the 1,589 children we helped in 2024; however, we didn't expect the size of increase we actually received! This year we provided gifts for 2,201 children from 941 local families. This increase of an extra 612 children was unprecedented and did put a strain on our resources, but as Christians we trust God that he will provide and we found that you – our supporters – rose to the challenge.

We are so grateful for the role you played – whether you prayed for us, helped with the admin, donated money, donated gifts, gave your time to volunteer, supervised craft activities, arranged for Santa to visit, spread the word, packed up gifts for the families, provided a distribution location or anything else; however you helped, please know that we couldn't do it without you!

The value of gifts we gave out this year was over £33,000. Without people like you we couldn't continue to run this project, so thank you.

This year we again had six locations across the city where families could choose to collect their gifts from; some of these ran activities for the children too. Santa joined us at the Coventry City Mission sessions and he gave selection boxes to all of the children in addition to the gifts that they would later receive. The families took the gifts home at the end of the session with wrapping paper to wrap them and hide until Christmas morning.

I have received a number of thank you messages from the parents who are so grateful for our support at this challenging time.

We will be running this project again at Christmas 2026 and there will, yet again, be many ways you can be involved. I'll write to you in September with some ideas, however, in the meantime please do share the word and if you know of anyone else who would like to be involved, please put them in touch with me (sarah@covcitymission.org.uk). To continue to meet this level of need we will need to find even more people and churches to support us.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND



In October 2025, a London church blessed many pets on the feast day of St Francis. In December there was a service for pets at Christmas with 400 people at the Sunday service and upwards of 100 the next day. To keep order, a ticketing system was used plus a small charge, with the congregation forming queues for the blessing of their pet by one of five clergy. This church is now looking into the possibility of an Easter service. Many of the owners had found out about the services from social media, with some travelling from as far afield as Cambridge. Since this type of service commenced, congregation numbers have increased. Research has noted that lots of people on their own, or folk who had recently lost a pet, attended.

Six Franciscan friars have established a micro-brewery in an old carpenter's workshop in Montespaccato, Rome. This area was created by Mussolini for people from slum clearances in central Rome. The brewery produces 2,000 litres of beer a month to local restaurants and for their own eatery which is open Thursday to Saturday – not open on Sundays since that would conflict with Mass. Since its opening in 2023, the brewery has brought jobs and training to this low-income area. One beer is named *The Oaks of Mamre*, a biblical reference to the place where Abraham met three angelic visitors (Genesis 18). The Franciscans are less well-known for their brewing compared with Trappist monks, but have brewed since the Middle Ages, when nutrient-rich ale was ideal for getting them through Lent fasting. One of the friars is also an expert on artificial intelligence (AI) and lectures at the Gregorian university in the Vatican.

Researchers looking at church pipe organ tuners' notebooks have discovered that climate change has altered the tone of the notes produced more than had been thought.

Co-op Funeral Care has surveyed 90,000 funerals, noting the music chosen. Most popular is *Time to say Goodbye* followed by *My Way* and then *Somewhere over the Rainbow*; however, becoming popular is the theme music from the film *Jaws*.

Epiphany celebrations in France involve cake. This practice originated in the 13th century when gold nuggets were hidden inside the small cakes, symbolising gifts brought to Jesus by the three wise men. Austerity came with the use of beans, and in the 19th century, small porcelain figures were concealed in the frangipane filling. This custom still continues, with the finder of the figure getting the right to wear a paper crown. It is estimated that 60 million Epiphany cakes are sold every January. One town has nine bakeries which have united, selling cakes for a prize of two gold rings. Other towns offer "spend £14-£22 on Epiphany cakes to enter a draw for a 208 Peugeot car"; another town offers a prize of a £450 synthetic diamond.

Theological Reflections – Membership

In January we welcomed Les into membership, and you may have wondered: what is membership all about? The official URC leaflet¹ describes: “becoming a Church Member means becoming a recognised part of the world-wide family of Christians. This is a community of people who believe in God.

Being part of this family encourages us in our faith as we work together to show God’s love and mercy to the world.” Most churches have some sort of membership structure, some more formal than others. Some would argue that membership is not mentioned in the Bible and there was no form-filling in the New Testament, they were saved and became part of the church. I would argue that Baptism was the method those Christians used to identify as Church Members; the message of the Apostles was to believe and be baptised.

We are all probably members of different organisation, whether that be the local golf club, the gym, a school, WI, Crafting Mondays or similar activities. We love to belong; we want to be recognised as part of that association or clan. Some people even wear the “old school tie” to impress on people their heritage or to open new doors. However, church membership is more than that: we are identifying with God’s people, that we want to be part of God’s Mission at Baginton Road. The reception service includes the words we “promise to share with us in the life of this church, and to be faithful in the privileges and responsibilities of church membership”. If I join the golf club then it is because I want to meet like-minded people and to participate in the sport – and the same with church membership, we want to participate in church life.

If you are not a Member, is it time you became one? Only those who are Church Members are entitled to vote on the decisions of the church, which shape the continuing life of our fellowship. Please speak to one of the Elders to find out more.

An integral and important part of our church life is the Church Meeting which the URC describes “as where all Members gather to seek God’s will and to discuss the life and work of the church” or, to use Baptist terms, “seek the mind of Christ”. The Church Meeting is not just to affirm the decisions of the Elders, but to seek the mind of Christ in respect of those decisions. At a recent conference², Ruth Moriarty said “when Baptists discern together, it is to honour each other as members of the body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12:4-27), who gather together to encounter the presence of Christ (Matthew 18:20) as members of the priesthood of all believers (1 Peter 2:5) and as recipients of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:1-18). Although her research was in a Baptist context, the Church Meeting holds a similar role in the URC perspective.

According to “The Manual”, the functions of the Church Meeting come under two headings:

1. Looking Outward:

- to further the Church's mission in the locality;
- to develop local ecumenical relationships;
- to further the Church's compassionate ministry in the locality and throughout the world;
- to consider and support the wider work of the Church at home and abroad;
- to consider public questions in relation to the Christian faith;
- to bring concerns for consideration by the Elders' meeting and wider councils of the Church.

2. Looking inwards:

- Election of leaders, elders and officials
- Membership applications/transfers
- Financial reports
- Reports from the relevant committees.

From experience, we often get “bogged down” in the business side of the meeting, so that we do not have time to consider other areas. When did we last discuss “public questions in relation to the Christian faith” or “how we can further the Church's Misson in the locality?” If the Church Meeting is an opportunity to determine the mind of Christ for the Church, then we need to leave space for this to happen – maybe we would need a different approach, to challenge the status quo. How can we know the mind of Christ if we don't have time to seek and listen to him?

Paul reminds us: “now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it” (1 Cor 14:27) and, as Karl Barth (1954, pp. 63–64)³ explains, “the real church becomes visible insofar as it emerges and shines forth from its ecclesiastical organisation, tradition and custom, in the power of the Holy Spirit”. If we want to be a visible vibrant church, that needs to be done by seeking and listening to God and in the power of the Spirit. As Paul says: “The person with the Spirit makes judgements about all things, but such a person is not subject to merely human judgements, for who has known the mind of the Lord so as to instruct him? But we have the mind of Christ” (1 Cor 2:15-16).



In it I mention the ‘Luminous Web’; in simple terms, this suggests that every part of every atom is in some way connected to every other part in the universe.




This is mind-boggling; but far from disproving God, I believe it is opening a way to a concept of God that is believable in to-day’s world.




Coventry Walking Groups and Routes

Candlemas, 2nd February, comes exactly 40 days after Christmas. In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present Him to the Lord'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple (Luke 2: 22-40). So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day.


